But as He Isn't Doing Anything of the Kind the State is Solid for the Democrats.

MINNESOTA CONGRESSMEN.

The result in Minnesota upon Congressmen is not fully known, but there seems little or no doubt that White, Wakefield, Gillilan and Nelson, all Republicans, are elected.

In the Third District the indications are that Mr. Donnelly is elected and it is probable that fuller returns (his strength being among the farmers) will increase his prospects.

The returns from Washington county put a dampener upon all hope for the election of Capt. Merriman. Gillilan having carried that county by over 1,000 majority.

THE PRESIDENCY.

ALL RIGHT STILL.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The World claims New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Wisconsin and probably Michigan and Louisiana, and says Cleveland has 219 electoral votes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5, 3:30 a. m.—The indications are that Blaine has carried New York state by 8,000 to 10,000. New York returns from three-fourths of the city show Blaine for mayor by a large majority. It is not yet possible to state the result. The probabilities are that Grant is elected.

GALVESTON, Nov. 4.—On the state ticket Gov. Ireland, Democrat, will probably have 80,000 plurality. The entire Democratic ticket will hardly be carried. The Republican ticket in every ward in the city with the exception of one, and also including the German wards. Republican gains in the state are attributed by the Republicans in a good measure to the fact that the Germans over the supreme court discussion on the Scott liquor law.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Eighty-five precincts in this city give Cleveland 26,323, Blaine 25,000, and 1,324 for governor. A brief telegram announced the re-election of Wm. R. Morrison, Democrat. In Chicago Dunham, Republican, First district, is re-elected. In the Second, the fight is close between Finery, Independent, and Blaine, Democrat. In the Third district James H. Ward, Democrat, elected as a result of the triangular fight in that district, growing out of arbitration declaring George R. Davis not the regular nominee. In the Fourth district, Adams, Republican, is re-elected.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—Eighty voting places show a net Republican gain of 370.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—Six hundred and fifty-seven wards and precincts in Ohio show a net Republican gain of 11,550 over 1884, and a net Democratic gain of 1,374 over 1880.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 4.—Returns come in slowly. The state is Republican by about 18,000.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Gen. Logan at 12:30 received a telegram from the national committee saying the indications were that New York had given Blaine and Logan 10,000 to 12,000 majority.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Sixty-four precincts in this city give Blaine, Democrat, for governor, 3,270 majority.

BURLINGTON, Iowa, Nov. 4.—The Democrats claim the election of Hall in the First district by 500 to 600 majority.

LYNCOLE, Neb., Nov. 4.—Lafollette, Republican, is elected in the Second district by a majority of 2,000. No intelligent estimate of the state. Dawes, Republican, for governor, badly scratched. The vote in this city cannot be counted till 4 o'clock.

MARYLAND, Nov. 4.—The Democrats claim to have elected five out of six congressmen, being a gain of one.

MISSOURI, Nov. 4.—The State Democratic committee claim the election of the entire congressional delegation.

He thought Brown in the Sixth, Johnson in the Eighth, and in the Ninth districts, Republicans, are elected to congress. The result in the Seventh, Tenth and Thirteenth districts is doubtful. Other districts are thought to be Democratic.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—The returned and ninety-seven wards and precincts in Ohio show a net Republican gain of 9,016 over 1884, a net Democratic gain over 1880 of 1,002. Seventy-one precincts in Hamilton county give a net Republican gain over 1884 of 5,533, which indicates a majority in the county of 6,000.

CITY CLERK, Pa., Nov. 4.—City returns are being counted very slowly, owing to the fact of four tickets in the field, and many Republican tickets are being counted. The Democratic presidential ticket. The indications are that the Republicans will retain their majority of 165 and perhaps make some gain.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 4.—Sixty precincts give Blaine 7,822, Fusion 4,998, St. John 66, Butler 553. A net Republican gain of 943.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—Five hundred and fifty wards and precincts in Ohio show a net Republican gain of 10,181 over 1884. A net Democratic gain of 1,374 over 1880. In this city give Blaine 18,680, Cleveland 18,659; for governor, forty-three precincts give Harrison 13,453, Orlin 10,280.

DECATUR, Ia., Nov. 4.—Linehan, Democrat, is elected in the Sixth district with 535 majority in this city, which insures the election of Henderson, Republican.

MEMPHIS, Nov. 4.—Indications point to the election of Taylor, Republican, in this, the Tenth district, defeating J. M. Harrison, Democrat.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 4.—Scattering returns only, received from all quarters show a Democratic sweep of the state on the presidential ticket and congressmen. Cockrell, Democrat, is elected chief justice. No details to-night.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—The Chronicle says the figures received show there can hardly be any question about California being safe for Blaine. A dispatch from Newark, N. J., states that the New Jersey state was restricted in a manner which gives the Republicans a hard pull in congressmen, but from the present indications the Republicans will elect their men in the First, Third, and Sixth districts, with the Second and Fourth doubtful, with the chances in favor of the Democrats.

The Atlas says the returns are coming in so slow there is very little to base an estimate on the result on this coast. Both parties are confident that the state will probably be carried by the Democrats. It has gone Democratic by 1,500 to 3,000.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4, 2:40 a. m.—Returns on the city and state are coming in slowly and very much scattered. Nothing further in the districts can be heard from congressmen. The returns from the city and state are running very close for governor and it will probably take the complete returns from Cook county to determine the result. Two hundred and forty-four precincts heard from show a net Democratic gain of 11,000. This ratio should hold out and would give the state to the Democrats by a quite decided majority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Corrected Returns.—Cleveland's majority in this city is 53,083. Cleveland's majority in the state is 100,000. Queens and Richmond counties reaches almost, if not quite 25,000. In 1880 Garfield came to New York county with 63,000. It is unlikely, so far as heard from in the interior of the state, that Blaine's vote in the interior county will be the majority.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 4.—The city of Charleston gives fusionists electors 43 majority, Snyder, Democrat, for congress, 242 majority.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.—At 1 o'clock this morning but 210 of 1,200 towns and precincts in the state have reported. They show a Democratic gain of 6,900 over 1880 on the presidential vote, and if a like rate of increase is had in the remaining precincts it will give a net Democratic gain of 10,000. The state ticket is unquestionably elected. Indications are that Caswell, Republican, First congressional district, Bragg, Democrat, Second, Lafollette, Republican, Third, Kaunin, Democrat, Fifth, Price, Republican, Sixth, and Republican, Seventh, are elected with the Fourth, Sixth and Seventh districts in doubt. The presidential vote is claimed by both Republican and Democratic state committees.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—At 10 o'clock General Logan was receiving dispatches over a private wire from the city of Chicago, that he had not heard from either Blaine or Elkins. He was unwilling to profess as to the result.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—The returns he is receiving that New York will give 10,000 either to Blaine or Elkins. His views from Connecticut are encouraging. He has had no reports from New Jersey or West Virginia. Yet, on the other hand the Independent returns are counting Illinois as a doubtful state.

TOPEKA, Kansas, Nov. 4.—The official vote of this county, Shawnee, can't be learned to-night. Martin, for governor, carried the county by a majority estimated at 10,000.

PORT SCOTT, Kansas, Nov. 4.—All wards in the city and three precincts give Blaine 662 majority. The Republican state ticket 657.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.—Three hundred and twenty towns and precincts in Wisconsin give a net Democratic gain of 9,359. Both the Democratic and Republican state central committees claim the state, but will give no figures. The Republicans have gone home. The Democrats' headquarters are still open. Milwaukee city and county not all in yet.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—A Journal special says the Republican clerk and judge at Fairland, Shelby county, refused to sign the election returns, claiming that the votes were illegal because the ballot box stuffed. An armed mob has taken possession of the town and declare they will kill the clerk and judge unless they sign the returns. A sheriff and posse of men have gone to the scene.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—Sixty towns out of 108 give Blaine 22,860, Cleveland 23,892. A Republican loss of 653.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4.—Meager returns, but the Democratic committee concedes the election to the congress from this, the Fifth district, and that Blaine is elected governor, and the Republican county ticket has carried Jackson county, showing a large Republican gain. The Fifth ward in the city completed shows 540 Republican majority.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—One hundred and fifty-one precincts, including 63 precincts in Chicago, give Ogleby, Republican, for governor, 36,387; Harrison, Democrat, 29,317. One hundred and seventy-two precincts outside of Cook county show a net Democratic gain of 8,325.

JACKSON, Mich., Nov. 4.—One hundred and thirty-one precincts, including three wards in Jackson, four wards in East Saginaw and six wards in Port Huron, give Cleveland 3,925, Blaine 3,443.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 4.—Eighty towns give Blaine 29,955, Cleveland 30,822. Garfield had 31,088, Cleveland 29,474. Republican loss 2,451.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Blaine is undoubtedly elected to congress in the Second district. For governor, Harrison, 30,218, Waller 31,242.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 4.—Election in Hudson quiet, and realizing that a sweeping Democratic victory over the entire county ticket being elected. McCool leads and is re-elected congressman by about 5,000, a majority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Gibbs, Republican, 5,278, a net Democratic gain of 3,269 in Columbia Co., Nov. 4.—The election placed quietly in this city. The greatest excitement prevails to-night over the returns from other states, New York commanding the greatest attention at both headquarters. The Democrats are claiming a decided victory on the general result and the most active in furnishing boures and parading the streets.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 4.—The Democrats claim a majority in this state of from 20,000 to 25,000, electing four out of six congressmen with two in doubt.

It is estimated Cleveland's majority in Cook county will be between 3,000 and 4,000. Harrison's majority is 10,000 to 12,000.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 4.—Three hundred and eighty-six towns and precincts, including 107 precincts, give a net Democratic gain of 10,378. The entire state Republican ticket is elected without doubt. Congressmen stand six Republicans, two Democrats and one in doubt. The presidential vote will be very closely contested.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 4.—Sixty towns out of 168 give Blaine 23,800, Cleveland 23,892. A Republican loss of 633 since 1880. For governor, Harrison 23,082, Waller 24,064, scattering 916. The state is claimed by the Democrats. The same towns give Concord, N. H., Nov. 4.—One hundred and five towns give Blaine 18,015, Cleveland 14,141. St. John 698, Butler 193. Blaine's plurality 3,860. The same towns give Garfield 18,290, Hancock 17,908, Garfield's plurality 1,002. The same towns give Currier 17,835, Hill, 17,518, Mason 672, scattering 138. RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 4.—Returns from 80 precincts of this state show a Democratic gain of 111. This indicates a very close vote, and if the ratio of Democratic gain is not increasing in the remaining precincts the state may go Republican. There are about 1,000 voting precincts in the state.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—In eighteen congressional districts, three towns missing, Stone Republican, has 10,444; Spofford, Democrat, 7,711; Baker, People's, 1,103; Stone, People's, 1,002. The same towns are probably secured in the towns to be heard from.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 4.—Eighty-nine precincts in seventeen wards of this city give Cleveland 7,491, Blaine 6,200, Marmaduke, Democrat, 4,070. For governor, Fusion 7,306, Brooks, Republican, 76, Glover, Democrat, 9,051; McLean, Republican, 4,264; O'Neil, Democrat, for congress in Eighth district, 1,502, Eccles 878. Clearly, Democrat Tenth district, 902, Morse, Independent, 1,082. THE DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY LARGE. [Special Telegram to the Globe.] NEW YORK, 8:30 p. m.—The returns indicate greater Democratic gains than anticipated. The counting at the police headquarters in this city is progressing rapidly, and the Democratic managers estimate that Cleveland will have 75,000 majority in New York city, and will carry the city by 50,000. Returns from Connecticut show Blaine and Cleveland very close, but the districts to be heard from are Democratic, and it is expected that Cleveland will have a good majority. It is raining here, but there seems no diminution in excitement.

THE BETTING. [Special Telegram to the Globe.] NEW YORK, 8:30 p. m.—Betting on the general result has amounted to \$100 to \$600 in favor of Cleveland. He is gaining steadily and the returns so far are more in his favor than the most sanguine expected. This side of Harlem he has got 20,000 more than Hancock got. The Democratic majority in Connecticut is set down at 5,000 and New Jersey will give as much and possibly more.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 4.—The Democrats claim a majority in this state of from 20,000 to 25,000, electing four out of six congressmen with two in doubt.

DETROIT, Nov. 4.—It is impossible to state definitely the result of the election in this state. The last bulletin sent indicates the Republican state and national tickets are ahead, but at the rate of Democratic gains there seems a chance the state will go Democratic. However, the upper peninsula is not all heard from and its results are not known.

DETROIT, Nov. 4.—Returns from the interior are coming in slowly. None of the cities or important towns are heard from. Prominent Democrats, relying upon private advices, admit the next legislature is unquestionably Republican. Congressmen are still in doubt. The Republican state ticket is elected beyond reasonable doubt, with probable exception of lieutenant governor. Blaine's majority will reach 300, a slight gain over the vote for Garfield in 1880.
