THE INQUEST.

Coroner Quinn's Jury Find That Amelia Cummings Came to Her Death From Natural Causes.

An inquest was held at O'Halloran's by Coroner Quinn yesterday evening on the remains of Della Cummings, the woman whose body was found frozen in the Sixth ward last Sunday morning.

A note was first read from Rev. J. W. Neals, to the effect that the name of the deceased was Mrs. Cummings and that she had worked as a domestic in the family of Chas. Slavin, on Exchange street.

The latter was then sworn and testified that the deceased had been in his employ about two years ago; witness could not say that she was addicted to drink, but thought by the way she acted she was a little out of her mind; he thought she had a husband, but could not say where he was.

Sergeant Morgan was sworn, and testified to the circumstances of finding the body. Four boys, Albert and Hugo Houser, Frank Lucas and E. Erdman then testified in succession.

The first named lad testified that he had been at Erdman's store Saturday night waiting for his brother to come from the opera house. That when the latter came at 11:30 o'clock, he told them there was a drunken woman down on the river; that they went down to see about it, and finding her almost frozen they assisted her to the store, where she warmed her feet; some of the boys were playing cards, and when they started for home at 1:30 o'clock the woman accompanied them to Eva street, saying she resided in a small house described by the witness.

The testimony of the other boys was substantially the same, all agreeing that they had left her at 1:30 o'clock. They also testified that she drank nothing while in the store. Dr. Owens testified to having made an autopsy on the remains, and he gave it as his opinion that she died from nothing but exposure. A verdict was brought in accordingly.

Suits in the U. S. Circuit Court. Suits were begun in the United States circuit court yesterday as follows:

By John McLaughlin, administrator of the estate of Mary McLaughlin vs. The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad company, for \$5,000 damages. The complaint alleges that the deceased was a passenger on the road of the defendant, June 21, 1883, and that while riding on the cars she was thrown from her seat; a miscarriage resulted from which she died. It is alleged that her death resulted from being thrown from her seat by the recklessness of the company, and hence the suit.

An action by D. M. Osborn & Co. vs. W. P. Baker & Co., to collect the face value of notes amounting to \$1,848.

An action by Andrew Frink vs. The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad company, for restitution of premises and damages of \$1,000.
