An English Member of Parliament writes...

THE ENGLISHMAN'S CIPHER TELEGRAM.

CHARLESTON, JAN. 16, 1865.

To HON. J. P. BENJAMIN, Richmond, Va.: I have written you fully, but time presses. I have seen and heard all here, and could you do so you would be forced to the conviction that nothing can appease and revive the public spirit but the immediate appointment of Johnson's cabinet.

CHARLESTON, JAN. 16, 1865.

To GOV. A. G. MAGRATH: Yours of the 15th received to-day. I had no information of the withdrawal of troops by Gen. Bragg.

Will communicate with Gen. Lee, who commands the district including Wilmington, North Carolina. Butler's division was directed to proceed as rapidly as possible to South Carolina.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CHARLESTON, JAN. 21, 1865.

To PRESIDENT DAVIS, Richmond, Va.: I am so impressed with the belief that in the military operations of the next few days in this State, the fate of our country will be decided.

I am using all influence with Gov. Brown and Gov. Vance to keep our states together, and to prevent any further disunion.

I will appreciate the motive which leads me to write to you in this manner, and I am sure that you will be able to do all that is in your power to sustain the people of these States.

My DEAR SIR: My letter and telegrams to you, my letter to Mr. Barwell, and that to Gen. Lee, will have so fully explained my views in relation to our present condition.

Gen. Hardee is prepared to defend Charleston to any extremity. But to defend Charleston even to the last extremity will be a waste of time and strength.

If the cause is not desperate, then the safety of the army is of consequence. But that the cause is desperate, and that it can be sustained only by the aid of the people, can be successfully maintained.

What prevents this series of disasters? What, I may ask, insures safety and success? The defeat of Gen. Sherman's army and the frustration of his plans of extended campaign.

My own observation has long since brought me to the saddening conviction that, however honest it may be, still the policy of the government was most unwise.

There has been a belief that there would be no war; succeeded by the hope, because of the success of the army, that the war would be a short one, and that it would be terminated by the aid of the people.

what I now repeat, that with all of the disasters which have befallen us, we are physically not overthrown.

It is not the feeling of despondency which is so prevalent can be lightened by success; but continuous disaster will envelop the whole country in its folds.

I have said that morally we are more reduced than physically. I believe that the army of Virginia is, perhaps, the only exception to this truth; but even there the influences will be felt, and perhaps in the worst form.

And if you go beyond this, the difficulties increase with each step. Great reduction of territory, great loss of population, great loss of revenue, all rise up before us.

Look at the condition of public affairs here. Charleston is the only city in the State that is not in a state of anarchy.
