Up to yesterday the city treasurer returned the sum of \$9,000 to property owners on East Seventh street, being rebates on the assessment for the viaduct.

Garfield Post, G. A. R., is ordered to assemble this evening in its hall at 7 o'clock, in full uniform, to participate in the Lincoln memorial at Turner hall.

Officer Pat Gibbons found a fine canopy-top baby car last night, which a careless East Seventh street storekeeper had neglected to take in when closing up for the night.

The fact that no property is exempt from seizure for taxes under the new law is beginning to dawn upon delinquents, and they are passing in to liquidate their indebtedness.

Messrs. Auerbach, Finch & Van Slyck received a dispatch from the Hudson Bay company for 1,000 blankets, to be shipped by express, and they are now on their way to the land of rebellion.

The Capital Council of the Northwestern Legion of Honor will meet at the K. P. hall, Third and Wabasha streets, at 7:30 o'clock to-morrow night, for the purpose of installing officers.

Papers in the case of William Ellias against Herman Cornutt were yesterday filed with the clerk of the district court. It is a reply to plaintiff's answer, and denies minor particulars regarding a disputed note.

The Little Workers of Dayton Avenue church will give an evening's amusement in the way of music, recitations and refreshments on Thursday, with a view of raising a sufficient amount to defray the expense of a children's window in the church.

A select and brilliant audience assembled at Standard hall last night, the occasion being an informal social hop by St. Paul council, Royal Arcanum, No. 656. The affair was one of the most thoroughly enjoyable of the season.

No quorum presented itself at the meeting of the Junior Pioneer last night in the district court room, consequently no business was transacted. Another call is issued for next Tuesday evening, and business will be pushed then if members have to be dogged up.

Two young men entered Flannery's liquor establishment last night, at 226 East Seventh street, and while the proprietor's attention was attracted to the rear, one of the men seized a bottle of valuable wine and ran out. He was captured before getting far, and was allowed to depart.

The alarm of fire from box No. 238, at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, was occasioned by the burning of the roof of a one-story shanty at the junction of Minnehaha and Kenney streets. The house was occupied by Benjamin Jones, and owned by John Anderson, the loss being about \$20.

The boiler makers held a meeting at their hall last night, on the corner of Jackson and Seventh streets. Ten new members were initiated into the union, and an address was delivered by Charles Stevenson. It is believed to be expedient to merge the organization into a Knights of Labor assembly. The new Wabasha Street bridge. The new Wabasha street bridge was inspected by the city engineer Saturday and pronounced a complete and satisfactory. The contractors, Messrs. Hinsley, Shire & Tullock of Leavenworth, Kan., have performed the entire work in a creditable manner, replacing the old wooden bridge with a strong and elegant structure of iron having a carrying capacity much greater than that of the old bridge. The work of erection has been done under the direct supervision of Mr. P. Wagner, superintendent of construction, and has been carried on without interruption to travel at any time. The total cost of the new work so far has been about \$130,000. The whole of the structure has been replaced excepting the old iron span near this end, which will have to be rebuilt within a short time. We are informed that when this span is replaced with a new one similar to the others the bridge will be considered by expert engineers one of the best bridges on the Mississippi river.
