Meeting of the Merchants' Board of Trade--Proposition for Starting a Glass Factory.

Smith and Door Factory--Stuss's Flouring Mill Burned--Catholic Fair--A Serious Runaway.

The Merchants' Board of Trade. Yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock the Merchants' board of trade met at the city hall, with the president, A. K. Doe, in the chair, and W. T. Per Lee acting as secretary.

Some dozen new members joined, and nearly every member was in attendance. The meeting was presided over by the committee appointed to ask the city council for the use of the city hall in which to meet, stating that the council had granted them the use of the hall for their meetings.

Mr. D. Leubrie, representing the Inter Ocean newspaper of Chicago, appeared before the board, stating that it was the intention of the publishers of that journal to give a half-page write-up of the city, its business and chances for manufacturers, asking no pay for the same, but requiring subscribers to the daily for three months.

Mr. Hening read a letter which had been sent to the board of trade by a Mr. Haley, in reference to starting a glass factory here, to employ 100 men continually, asking as a condition that the city should give him a plot of land on which to erect the factory.

Mr. Haley said he considered that this was an excellent point for the establishment of a glass factory, as everything here is in a state of activity, and the spot. The mills was good, and as the refuse from the mills could be used as fuel, that could be had in abundance. He said that if the citizens would take stock, he and his friends, all practical workmen from Pittsburg, Mo., would be glad to engage to keep a force of 100 men constantly employed. The concern would require \$50,000 capital. Glass of all kinds could be manufactured here and the carriage from Pittsburg, Mo., would be sent to the city.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Doe, Hening and Kelly were appointed to confer with Mr. Haley and report at a special meeting to be held next Wednesday afternoon, to which time the meeting adjourned.

Death of W. F. Barstow. The city was startled yesterday morning to learn of the death of Mr. W. F. Barstow, who for the past seven years has been a popular resident of the city.

His death was the result of inflammation of the bowels. On Tuesday last week he was one of the clerks of election, was taken sick with chills in the afternoon and went home sick after the polls closed. He was first taken with pneumonia, which was followed by inflammation of the bowels, from which he died.

Some seven years ago Mr. Barstow came West, being engaged as cashier of the Northwest Manufacturing & Car company, his uncle, Mr. C. P. Cogswell, banker, Norway, Minn., had been in the employ of the oldholders of the company. He has been in the employ of the company ever since in various positions.

Mr. Barstow was very popular, and although of slight frame, was a leader in all kinds of games. He was an enthusiastic ball player and a member of the team belonging to Joseph Schepke & Sons, which was then delivering goods for shipment. About 1 o'clock yesterday morning Stuss's flouring mill, about two miles from the city and near the Duluth road track, was burned down. Some time since Mr. Stuss sold the mill to a Mr. Cook, a practical miller, who has been running the mill all winter and had considerable wheat, flour, bran and shorts on hand. Everything was burnt, as no one was about the mill when the fire occurred. The mill was valued at \$7,000, on which was an insurance of \$3,000.

The water is very low between this city and Taylor's Falls, much lower than usual at this time of the year. Capt. Knapp of the Cleon says that the water is rising, but many of the streams running into the St. Lawrence still flow back into the lakes. Yesterday the steamer took down from Osoosha, Wis., 200 barrels of flour and considerable other freight from various points. There have been several changes among the crew of the Cleon this year. Nelson Fulton is engineer, Thomas Rowell steward and Charles Knapp deck hands.
