Disastrous Fire at Billings.

BILLINGS, Mont., May 3, 1:20 a. m.—This town was visited by a great disaster to-night. The First National bank, the property of Stebbins, Munn & Co., the recently consolidated Herald, and the Livingston and Bevere hotels and two saloons were wiped out at Livingston by flames.

Such a loss on a new town like Billings is a serious set back, but the people there are not discouraged. They will restore the ruin wrought. The bank outfit is in the hands of an enterprising firm, the resident member being the hustler Munn, and he can't be discouraged by either the fire or the loss of the Herald. The fire occurred at such late hour that the full details of loss and insurance cannot be given.

Fire at Livingston.

LIVINGSTON, May 3.—The Livingston hotel, owned by J. P. Nolan, Vore Brothers' saloon, Revere hotel, owned by P. Montague, and Higgins Brothers' saloon were destroyed by fire last night. They were all two-story buildings. The fire started at the east end of the business portion of the town. The fire originated in the Livingston hotel, from an unknown cause. The total loss is about \$12,000, of which \$7,000 is covered by insurance held principally by J. P. Nolan and Vore Brothers.

Hotel Burned.

LANESBORO, Minn., May 3.—The Lanesboro hotel at this place burned down last night at about 12:30. Very little was saved, but no lives were lost.

Lumber Interests.

EAU CLAIRE, May 3.—The lumbermen of the Northwest meet in convention at this place on the 20th to discuss matters appertaining to their interests and to consider the advisability of uniting to make further advances in the prices of lumber and other log productions. Some of the more prominent lumbermen here, as well as in DuBoque, Hamblin, Burlington, Moline and other points along the Mississippi, entertain the opinion that the curtailment of the log cut the past winter in all of the Northwestern lumber districts will prevent a surplus of the article in the market. It is well known that many of the larger lumber corporations failed to send any crews into the pines at all, being under the impression that the lumber would be purchased this spring at much cheaper rates than it would cost to put them in, though the labor and supplies were at least 30 per cent. cheaper on an average than in the winter of 1884. From the records received by a scaler the amount of the cut of the Chipewaut largely in excess of the amount intended. The convention will be attended by all heavy operators in this as well as other states.

A Busted Mill Company on Its Feet.

EAU CLAIRE, May 3.—The Pioneer Lumber company that made an assignment with liabilities amounting to \$268,000 has started its mill under the superintendency of Col. George W. Leopold, assignee, for the benefit of creditors. The mill is turned out on a new tract of 100,000 feet of lumber per day, all of which will be piled. The company has arranged for a sufficient amount of stock to keep the mill in operation until cold weather. The principal supplies of log productions will be to Kansas and Nebraska.
