STILLWATER NEWS.

Successful Annual Meeting of Stillwater Building Association.

A Sudden Death—A Thieving Vagrant—The New Saw Mill.

Building Association. The annual meeting of the Stillwater Building association took place at Music hall on Saturday evening.

The secretary, A. C. Hospes, presented a statement of the condition of the association at the end of the eighth year's business, which shows a highly satisfactory state of affairs and a proof that the business is managed with the greatest care.

From the report of the secretary it is learned that beginning with the second series, the first having matured, and including the eighth series 7,028 shares have been issued, of which 3,538 have been borrowed on them \$176,150, and the balance is all taken, but unpledged.

The second series, which is seven years old, is worth a premium of \$40.62 cash or \$43.54 book. The average bonus for the past six months was 35.77 per cent. and for the year 37.20 per cent. The number of loans made for the year was twenty-eight. Since the association started there has not been any bad loans, and payments by borrowers have been promptly met.

After the reception of the report the members proceeded to ballot for fifteen directors, Messrs. Perlee, Hening and Burlingham being appointed tellers, and the following were elected: J. A. Deragisch, H. J. Chambers, L. Sargent, L. Clark, F. E. Joy, F. M. Prince, Theodore Jassoy, W. D. King, R. W. Kerr, F. H. Ewing, Hugo Schlenk, S. P. Richardson, A. C. Hospes, W. K. Wardeman and A. Frederick. The officers will be chosen from these at the first meeting of the directors.

Accidentally Shot. William and Andrew Phelan, sons of J. N. Phelan, who lives on the Wisconsin side of the lake some two miles from this city, were accidentally shot by a revolver in the hands of the elder boy. It appears the boys were getting over a fence and William had a small revolver in his hand, and by slipping the weapon was discharged, the ball passing through his hand and lodging in the side of his brother, being so deeply imbedded that the doctors did not dare to extract it. The boys are not dangerously hurt.

Notes About Town. During the past week the bridge tolls only amounted to \$90.05. The Bun Hersey was actively engaged yesterday taking down brails of logs from the boom.

The steamer Cleon leaves this city at 1 o'clock sharp each day. Instead of 2 as incorrectly stated in yesterday's issue.

Mr. W. D. King left on Saturday evening for Missouri, called there through the death of his father, who was killed by the cars at Woodbury, some thirty miles from his home.

The water in Lake St. Croix is not falling at such a ratio as in the river, as the water is kept up by the Mississippi. The gauge yesterday showed 8 feet 3 inches above low water mark.

The steamer Luella passed down yesterday morning with three barges of mill wood consigned to parties in St. Paul. She had all she could do to manage them, owing to the high wind.

Mrs. Maddox, who lives some three miles east of this city in Wisconsin, had a cancer removed successfully from her breast yesterday afternoon at the city hospital. She is an old and well-known resident of this section.

The pile driver belonging to the Boom company, which has been at work for some time up the river for the Lumbermen's board of trade, came down yesterday morning and will put in some piles for J. S. Anderson & Co. at the head of the lake.

John Glade, the missing man, has been heard from. He tramped it to the house of his sister at Dubuque, Ia., taking seventeen days on the way. He intends remaining there and has sent for his clothes.

There here he was supposed to be insane and to have been examined in the probate court, when he escaped.

Since the St. Croix Boom Corporation company began work at the boom they have handled from 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 feet of logs with a force of less than two hundred men. On Friday 3,400,000 feet passed through, and on Saturday 3,500,000 feet. Never since the boom started was there such a showing with the same number of men. From present appearances they will have all the logs out before much of the new drive comes down.

Augustus Isaacson, who has been in the city for years, was found yesterday morning dead in Rahe & Hanson's stable on Main street. For about two years he was in their employ but a short time ago they had to discharge him owing to his love of drink, and he used to drink some of the most vile stuff imaginable, and must have died from such excess. On Saturday evening he was round the stable as usual, but was shaking badly. He has a brother who is a druggist at St. Croix Falls, Wis., and the doctor there says that town, all being highly respected members of society. His brother has been telegraphed to relative to the disposition of the body. The deceased was about 35 years of age.

As soon as the millwright arrives work will be begun on Turnbull & Blackman's new sawmill, and the foundation put in. Mr. Blackman expects that they will have to do some difficult piling, owing to the stones and gravel, but the part next the shore will have a solid stone wall under it, which will be started as soon as the location is fixed upon. He says they will not be able to drive it as rapidly as they would wish, owing to the building of another mill at Barnum, where they have charge of the Bliss & Elliott property. They will, however, keep a force at work there, and get the mill ready for work at the earliest possible moment. The machinery will arrive from Michigan at an early day.

Yesterday morning a trio of tramps were put at the Transfer roundhouse near Schulerburg's mill, and going down the track they were ordered by the watchman to take to the streets. In going by the old Schermuly house, now occupied by Mr. William Tranter, one of them entered, and getting into young Tranter's room, cabaged the greater part of his underclothing. Mrs. Tranter heard the noise, and dressing with all haste got out and followed them south on Main street. She demanded the clothes, when the tramps laughed at her and gave her some pretty hard talk which got her mad up, when she went for the tramps, taking the clothing by force from the one that had it, and afterwards sent for a policeman and had him arrested. He will answer for the theft this morning.
