Quarterly Meeting at the Capitol of the State Board of Corrections and Charities.

Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge of United Workmen--Crop Reports--Police Paragraphs.

UNITED WORKMEN. The Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge.

The ninth annual session of the Grand Lodge, Ancient Order of United Workmen having jurisdiction of Minnesota, Dakota and Manitoba, was held in this city yesterday.

Among the reports submitted was that of D. E. Vance, grand master workman, which stated the total increase in membership since the last annual session to have been 240, with twenty-two deaths. Eleven legions of the Select Knights of the order had been instituted in this state, and a Grand legion would shortly be instituted.

The report of Talbot Jones, M. D., grand medical director, stated that the whole number of applicants for membership during the year was 674, of which number fifty-two were rejected.

The average age of those dying was 45.3 years. The average duration of membership of those who died during the year was four years and three months. The average age of those admitted during the year was 35.4 years.

The financial statement of J. J. McCurdy, grand receiver, was submitted as follows: Balance to credit of Beneficiary fund, \$5,561 25.

The report of the grand recorder, William Cheney, was submitted, showing that 525 new beneficiary certificates had been issued during the year.

This report was also certified to by the chairman of the finance committee. The report of the supreme representatives instructed the supreme master workman to appoint a committee on ritual to consist of one member, authorized to revise the ritual on a certain basis.

It also recommended that the fiscal year for all jurisdictions for the purposes of the relief law be beginning Jan 1 ending Dec. 1 of each year. Several amendments to the constitution of the supreme lodge, and laws of general application were ordered.

The report of the relief board, which was convened for the purpose of investigating and determining the qualifications for assistance made by the grand lodge of Tennessee, was also made, stating it to be the determination of the board that they had no authority to grant relief for any exigency arising from losses occurring prior to March 19, 1880.

The Association's Quarterly Meeting. The quarterly meeting of the state board of charities and corrections convened at the state house yesterday morning.

The secretary presented his quarterly report, which was adopted and ordered printed in the next biennial report. A delegation from the Ramsey county board of commissioners appeared before the board, with Mr. George Wirth, architect, and presented plans for a poorhouse for the county.

The delegation consisted of Mr. Hazzard, chairman of the committee on the poorhouse, Dr. Konantz, chairman of the committee on public buildings, and commissioner Snyder. On motion of Dr. Dana the plans were approved, subject to the opinion of the committee on public buildings.

The plans are for a structure 140 feet in length by 42 feet in depth, with a wing in the middle rear 75 feet in length by 40 feet in width. The buildings are to be three stories high including basement, and are to be constructed with double brick walls.

The east side of the main building basement is to be occupied by males and the west by females, and the basement of the wing for a dining room, kitchen and steam-heating apparatus. The upper floor of the building will be occupied for sleeping apartments, the males being placed in one portion of the structure and the females in the other.

These plans will be submitted to the county commissioners for their approval at 10 a. m. to-day, and it is estimated that the building erected according to them will cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

AN INVITATION. On motion of Dr. Dana the following resolution was adopted: Whereas, The members of this board deem it of importance to the promotion of the general character and work of correctional and charitable institutions in the Northwest, and believe it would be likely to diffuse intelligence, and call public attention to the necessity of such boards in the new states west of us, and in the wise and early establishment of such penal and reformatory and charitable institutions as will be required at an early date; therefore be it

will be considerably increased over those of last year, while a larger degree of attention is being given to tame-grass meadows and pastures.

There seems to be no disposition to arrest the revolution begun a few years ago to devote the agricultural industry of the state more generally to diversified farming and stock growing, notwithstanding the fact that the expectation of high prices for wheat in the early future has contributed to extend the acreage of that crop this year.

The demand for farm laborers is about as usual at this season of the year and wages continue unchanged. The supply of labor is sufficient for the demand.

CATHOLIC ASSOCIATION. Successful Meeting at Chicago--Bishop Ireland Off For the East. CHICAGO, May 5.--An interesting meeting of the Irish Catholic colonization association was held to-day at the Grand Pacific hotel. Those present were Bishop J. L. Spalding of Iowa, who occupied the chair, William J. O'Connell, secretary, Bishop Ireland of St. Paul, Rev. James McGolrick of Minneapolis, Rev. D. J. Riordan of Chicago, Gen. Lawler of Prairie du Chien, John Fitzgerald of Lincoln, Neb., Anthony Kelly of Minneapolis, W. J. Quinn and P. J. Healey of Chicago. The secretary's report was read, showing assets of the association in land in the colonies, and other resources, to be \$100,000, and the liabilities to stockholders for stock and dividends \$75,000, leaving a surplus of \$25,000. It was also announced that \$17,000 in stock had been redeemed during the year, and it was estimated that \$20,000 in stock would be retired during the present year. Encouraging reports were received from Nebraska and Minnesota, where the organization has provided for about 1,000 families. Information was received that the bureau at Castle Garden was progressing nicely, and that the home established by Father Riordan for poor emigrant girls was doing much good and that he hopes to add to it a chapel to be built by subscription.

A dividend of 6 per cent on the stock was declared, and the secretary was empowered to continue to retire the stock as opportunity offered. At a meeting of the stockholders the following directors were elected: Rev. Stephen W. L. O'Connell, Anthony Kelly and William Lawler, John Fitzgerald and John P. Rend, all being re-elected with the exception of Mr. Rend, who was chosen in the place of P. J. Healey, resigned. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Bishop Spalding; vice president, Anthony Kelly; secretary, William O'Connell; treasurer, W. J. Quam. Bishops Spalding and Ireland left in the evening for Baltimore, where they will attend the meeting to be held in the interest of the erection of a new Catholic university in that city.

Crop Reports. WAKEFIELD, May 5.--Increase of acreage this year in this section is nearly one-third more than last year. Nature of seeding the same as last year. Increase at same ratio, about one-half given to corn, one-quarter to wheat, one-eighth to flax and one-eighth to oats. Small grain is looking well. The season is favorable and the prospects are for corn being planted in good season. The ground is in good condition. COLERIDGE, May 5.--Wheat and oats are coming up nicely; flax is being sowed on old ground and on land broken up last year. The bulk of the flax crop will be raised on land broken up this year. New land will be broken in large quantities this year, commencing next week.

Va., May 5.--An informal reception was given the state officers to-day by a parade of the cadets of the Kalmawia Military Institute, together with, probably, 2,000 people from the city and different parts of the state. The officers were welcomed back by Maj. Snyder in a short speech, which was responded to by Gov. Wilson and Secretary of State Walker. Great rejoicing exists among the people upon the return of the seat of government, which was taken from them in 1875.




