## A CASE OF RECIPROCITY. The Wholesalers Will Meet the Be-

tailers on Middle Ground. The retail grocers in Minneapolis, as is well known, have banded themselves into a species of protective union, the one object of which seems to have been to induce of which seems to have been to induce wholesale and commission men from selling to consumers. Many meetings have been held and a thorough organization completed, part of which was the appointment of a committee to confer with the wholesalers. The produce exchange has, for its part, considered the matter and in brief agreed to meet the retailers on middle ground. To meet the committee from the ground. To meet the committee from the Grocers' union it appointed a committee consisting of E. G. Potter, D. W. Longfellow, E. J. Grinnell, J. V. Slavin and A. M. Woodward. The Market Record, speaking authoritatively from the commission

nen, has this to say:
The Grocers' union, that perfected an organization a few weeks ago to protect the interests of retail grocers, has entered upon an aggressive campaign. About the first thing in sight that, in the opinion of the Grocers' union, needed straightening out was the practice of wholesale grocers, wholesale fruit and produce dealers and commission merchants selling direct to con-sumers. This was the head to be hit, and the union appointed a committee to hit it.
The committee embodied the idea of the grocers' union in the form of an agreement, and armed with this formidable document proceeded in a body, calling successively upon the different members of the whole-saling department for their signatures, binding the wholesalers to religiously sell to retailers only. A few signed, but many de tailers only. A few signed, but many declined to barter away the inalienable right of an American citizen to do about as he pleased. Yesterday a well-attended meeting of the produce exchange was held for the purpose of considering what to do with the Grocers' union's demand. A committee was appointed and that committee instructed to meet the committee of the Grocers' union and demand of it action that would keep the members of the Grocers' union out of the members of the Grocers' union out of the wholesalers' field. Retail grocers are the old wooden pipe which have been disin the habit of getting consignments from the wholesalers' customers whenever possible, and with these same consignments de-moralize the markets. Now the wholesalers' committee will say in substance to the retailers' committee, you walk on your side of the fence and we will keep on our side, but if you send your skirmishers within our lines, don't blame us if we forage
