GLOBULES.

John Pearson was arrested yesterday for stealing two hand saws from a carpenter named Harvey. The articles were recovered in a second-hand store on West Seventh street.

Mr. Grote has been fixing up his place in order to have it in good condition for the concert by the Great Western band. He has had the chairs all painted red and the tops of the tables green, while the interior of the pavilion is painted white.

At a meeting of the plat commission yesterday, Slater, Riley & Wessel's addition to St. Paul, containing thirty lots, was approved also J. W. Fallis's arrangement of block 2, E. G. Rogers' Second addition, containing sixteen lots.

Cayill, earnest temperance men of London, England, will participate in the exercises. The former will give a recitation and the latter an address.
