PARIS IN DANGER.

A riot possible at the Dead Poet's Obsequies.

New York, May 31.—The Times' Paris cable letter says: "Paris looks now as if Paris would not get so much excitement for its \$100,000 on Monday as was promised early in the week. The possibility of a riot is still in every mind, but the prevailing impression is that one will be averted if for no other reason than that the through-seers will be so enormous that it will dwarf the anarchist strength into insignificance. No doubt exists, however, of the intention of the more rabid of the revolutionists to attempt making trouble. The extreme section, which is represented by the Cri du Peuple, is enthusiastic over what it regards as a high triumph over the ministry and it is anxious to push it still further. That paper exults over the effect of the recent panic in securing the bourgeoisie. It asserts that since Tuesday large amounts of money have been drawn from the banks by wealthy citizens, who have fled from Paris, fearing an insur-

rection. That this should be regarded as a fine achievement affords a measure of sanity to ultra radicals like Lisbonne. Blood or no blood Paris is preparing for the event on a scale almost unexampled even here. The dead poet's obsequies will rival, in their unique and impressive splendor, the strangest and sublimest of the poet's concepts. Through three nights a large force has been working by the electric lights to get the arc de triomphe ready for the deposit of the pall to-morrow morning. The top of the cat-falque nearly touches the vaulted ceiling of that lofty monument. To-morrow night the interior will be shrouded in darkness, but the entire place de L'Etoile will be lighted by the torches of the guard of honor in addition to the lampadaries which burn until 3 o'clock. To-morrow morning salutes will be fired from the Invalides from the time of transfer to the hearse until the arrival at the Pantheon.

Will Case Settled.

Special to the Globe. Troy, N. Y., May 31.—When Gilbert G. Thompson, a prominent lumber merchant, died in 1881, society was shocked by Antoinette A. Barker declaring herself as Thompson's wife and entitled to her dower right in his estate, which is estimated at more than \$100,000. When the will was offered for probate objection was made by the woman that no provision had been made for her, but the will was admitted, and she then began nineteen suits against persons who had purchased real estate of Thompson. Yesterday a settlement was effected which will result in the withdrawal of all the complaints in these actions. A sister of the plaintiff was Thompson's wife and died in 1875. Antoinette had resided with the family, and she claimed that after her sister died Thompson and Miss Barker made a solemn agreement to live together as man and wife, and did so until his death and that Thompson frequently introduced her to friends as his wife. He was an invalid some time before his death, and Miss Barker nursed him with unremitting attention. The suits brought by her have been on the calendar four years. It is stated that she will be paid \$7,000 besides her legal expenses. She said to-day that she would not accept the settlement unless she was acknowledged as the widow, and that she authorized her attorneys to accept a settlement on that condition only.

Rabbi Moses in a Fix.

Milwaukee, May 31.—A stir of more than passing importance has been made in the leading Jewish church of the city in consequence of the manner in which Rabbi Moses has been managing certain church affairs. The trouble appears to have started from a little playful slap from the rabbi's hand given upon the face of a 13-year old lad while at Sunday school three weeks ago. Coming to his class late the lad was spoken to by the Rev. Moses and returned a reply which grated harshly on the sensitive ear of the reverend gentleman, who in turn gave the young man a little slap in the face. The latter's father, Hugo, threatened to bring legal action against the rabbi and several exciting meetings of the church trustees have been held and efforts were made to quiet the matter for a temporary season at least. It is even stated that the affair will result in the retirement of Rabbi Moses or the exodus of a large number of the church members.


