

OHIO'S LAST BREAK.

Returns Coming in Slowly and Charges of Corruption and Fraud in Cincinnati.

From Figures at Hand It is a Republican Victory Without Very Much Doubt.

The Campaign in Iowa Showing Symptoms of a Coming Determined Fight.

Virginia Apparently Safe in the Democratic Fold—Comments on the Ohio Event.

The Very Latest Returns.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 14.—A Commercial Gazette special from Columbus says: The Republican state committee claims a majority of two in the legislature on joint ballot. Allen O. Myers (Democrat) is defeated in Franklin county by 1,000 votes.

Returns Coming in Slowly.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 14.—The counting of the returns of yesterday's election is in a chaotic state. In precinct F of the Nineteenth ward, when the count had proceeded so far last night that 284 majority of the returns from Hamilton county Republican tickets had been counted, the judges stopped their work, and it has not yet been resumed.

Comments of the Eastern Press.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—The Eastern press is very chary of its remarks about the Ohio election. Especially is this true of the Democratic newspapers. The Baltimore Sun is silent on the subject. The New York World merely remarks in double leads that Ohio has gone Republican by a margin of 15,000 votes.

Both Sides Estimating.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 14.—The Republican executive state committee estimates the plurality of Foraker (Republican) for governor at 20,000 in case the present ratio of counts should continue in the returns on Tuesday's election.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—It seems to be pretty evident now from all information that can be had that the Republicans have little hope of carrying Virginia. The published returns of the congressman have carried the state. Your correspondent has information that they will have a majority on joint ballot.

An Exciting Bout in Iowa.

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WAR TO BE DECLARED.

King Milan of Serbia Gives Notice to the Powers that He Will Commence Hostilities.

He Finds He Must Either Abdicate His Throne or Stand His Chances in Battle.

Turkey and Greece Conclude a Secret Treaty Against Serbia and Bulgaria.

Trouble Brewing in British Burmah—King Thebaw Inclined to be Arrogant.

Hope Vanishing.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The hopes entertained last night of a peaceful settlement of the Roumelian question have been shattered this morning by the receipt of a dispatch from Constantinople that the conference has disavowed the Bulgaria-Roumelian union.

Will Go to War.

It is reported that King Milan of Serbia has informed the powers that he must either go to war to abdicate his throne, and that he has decided to go to war. He has prepared a manifesto to his army which is expected, it will be issued to-morrow.

Troops to the Front.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 14.—Great activity is being manifested throughout Turkey. Troops are being sent and equipped for immediate service. The sultan has determined to fight against a further dismemberment of Turkey, and large bodies of troops are being rapidly concentrated at the most strategic points.

The Porte is Only Waiting.

The porte is awaiting the final reply of the powers before taking decisive action. A portion of the cabinet recommend the recognition of the Bulgarian union. Others are of the opinion that Greece and Serbia will remain tranquil, if the union is not recognized.

Trouble in British Burmah.

CALCUTTA, Oct. 14.—King Thebaw of Burmah has answered the communication sent by the commissioner for British Burmah, in accordance with instructions from the Indian government with reference to the dispute between the Burmah government and the Bombay and Burmah trading association.

Foreign Flashes.

It is reported that the sultan of Zanzibar has sent the Danes-Siam to the German-African association. Danes-Siam is a seaport twenty-five miles south of Zanzibar and has a harbor.

Strange Occurrence on Lake Erie.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 14.—A singular and surprising coincidence was noticeable on Lake Erie yesterday. The strong east wind which was blowing here lowered the water two feet at this end of the lake so that the work of loading crafts with coal in the Blackwell canal had to be suspended.
