

THE ICE PALACE.

How the Structure of Ice Is Gradually Rearing Its Glistening Walls to the Clouds.

The American Flag Will Float from the Top of the Central Tower Monday Morning.

Over Three Hundred Uniformed Men to Leave the City on Excursions To-Night.

More than one hundred men are employed on the ice palace and Central park is about the busiest place in St. Paul. Those who have not seen the palace in a week will be surprised at the rapidity with which the work has been done and struck with the magnitude that the structure presents, even in its unfinished condition.
