

STRAIT ON EDUCATION.

The Minnesota Congressman Gives His Reasons for Opposing the Blair Education Bill.

He Asserts That Its Provisions Would Not Reach a Large Class of Illiterates.

The Winona Poles and Bohemians Quiet—A Settlement Looked For To-day.

Judge Pollard Banqueted at Bozeman—Painters on a Strike—Particular Accident.

Blair's Education Bill.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The educational bill got a black eye to-day. The labor committee, to which it was referred, in the belief that an early report upon it would be had, dawdled away the whole of its session without action. It was put by the friends of the bill with this committee in the hope it would act promptly some way in order to get the bill before the house, for they believed and yet believe that if they could get the bill before the house it would pass.

Yes, he said, "the committee is the body that is not a proper one, and not for the good of the country or of the people."

"How so? Don't you favor universal education?"

"Most assuredly, but not in that way. To begin with, I don't believe much in

GOVERNMENT AID to public schools as provided by the states are good, very good, and the cause of education is prospering everywhere, North and South. The rising generation is being educated, and the people who pay for it don't feel that it is a burden. I don't say, under all circumstances, I would oppose government aid to schools, but under the condition of this bill I certainly do."

"Why?"

"Well, the bill proposes to distribute the fund upon the basis of general average. I don't think that is a proper one. It ought to be divided, if given at all, upon the basis of illiteracy below a given age. Take the adult illiterates of the country, for example. They largely overbalance those of the North, and yet if this money is given they will not be benefited by it so far as schools and education are concerned. If you give \$100,000,000 to the schools in the South not one of the illiterate over 50 years of age would attend the schools provided by it. If the money is to be given for this purpose and is to be distributed according to the ratio of illiteracy, it ought to be with reference to the ratio of illiteracy among the class that would attend the schools which it is to provide."

"Then your objection to the bill are not based upon the constitutional question which vexes the soul of the average statesman?"

"I am not ready to discuss the constitutional question for the present. There is no need for it, for the bill is not likely to get into the house very soon. I think it probable, however, that the proposition for devoting the proceeds of the public lands to school purposes is a very desirable one, and that of this kind is to be adopted at all. But from different developments in both educational and laboring circles, I don't believe that any measure of this kind materializing in time for action by this congress."
