

STILLWATER DEMOCRATS.

The Young Men Intend to Take a Hand in Politics. A County Convention Called--The Lumber Outlook--Notes.

A young men's Democratic club will probably be organized some time soon. The young Democrats claim that the older ones have been running the politics of the city long enough, and now they propose to have something to say. Said a prominent young Democrat yesterday: "A certain clique has been running the caucuses, conventions and everything else for the past ten or fifteen years. None but old chaps have been sent to conventions for years and they have elected only two or three young Democrats to office for many years, and these were John C. Nelthaway, judge of the municipal court, Walter Lehman, register of deeds and John Burke to council. This is the only recognition we have ever had, and we don't propose to stand it. You can say that we propose to organize and have something to say about the caucuses, conventions and offices hereafter, and if we don't get any show we won't vote. This is not only so of the Democrats in Stillwater, but of the Republicans as well. The young Republicans made a grand kick, and the result was that the recent county convention selected delegates from the young Republicans and outside of the convention. This is the way it should be occasionally. We don't want the earth, but we want recognition."

The club if organized will probably be formed in a few days, and will probably be made a permanent organization. Yesterday Mr. John McCarthy, chairman of the county committee, issued a call for the county convention to be held at the court house in Stillwater on Tuesday, September 7, 1886, for the purpose of selecting eight delegates to the state and congressional conventions, the former to be held at St. Paul, September 14, the latter at Minneapolis, September 20. The various towns will be entitled to the following delegates: Afton, Cottage Grove, Forest Lake, Grant, Lakeland, Marine, Newport and Oneida each, 1; Baytown, Denmark, Goldfield, Stillwater town and Woodbury each, 2; First ward Stillwater, 10; Second, St. Third, 6. The caucuses will be held on Monday evening, September 6.
