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The executive committee of the Farmers' alliance set down on President SPRAGUE in a way to flatter that gentleman out. The alliance does not believe in offensive partisanship, and above all it does not propose to have itself made into a jackknife for cleaving politicians to trade with. When Mr. SPRAGUE was accused of using his position to further the interests of Mr. GILMAN he wrote an open letter denying that he was seeking to commit the alliance to Mr. GILMAN'S candidacy, but admitted that he was indignantly espousing his cause, and in doing so was exceeding a right guaranteed to every American citizen. In an address to the Farmers' alliance of Minnesota the executive committee recites this portion of SPRAGUE'S defense of himself and in reply says: "Imagine the president of the United States traveling around the country in a campaign with some avowed candidate for office, introducing him to public audiences and even making speeches in his behalf, and then publishing to the world that he did it only as a private citizen and notas president, and the absurdity of Mr. SPRAGUE'S position will appear in all its ridiculousness." They then go a step farther and declare that in their deliberate opinion Mr. SPRAGUE could not have gone into the support of any candidate without the indorsement of the body over which he presides. The committee reads Mr. SPRAGUE a lecture for his inconsistency by saying that the alliance is known "as advocacy of the cause of Mr. GILMAN would be construed to mean more than that of a private citizen, and it is well known and can be proved that Mr. GILMAN did construe it to mean the support of a large portion of the membership of our body." This can be construed into a very forcible intimation that while the alliance asserts in his right to exercise the privilege as a private American citizen, he should have had a more proper appreciation of the delicacy of his position as president of the alliance, and that he should have resigned his office before embarking in an active partisan canvass for anybody. It is evident to their minds that President SPRAGUE lacks the sensitiveness which the presiding officer of an honorable organization should possess, and they don't hesitate to say so. It will be a useful sort of lesson back to the time when Mr. SPRAGUE was a candidate for the place he now holds in the alliance, and when he was accused of being a supporter of GILMAN, he rose up like PETER of old, and bitterly denied the accusation. He has since been bringing fists meet for repentance for the sin of denying his lord and master, by rolling up his sleeves and working for him like a beaver. The committee says that "it was this denunciation of SPRAGUE'S position which led to the withdrawal of a heavy opposition to his re-election to the office he now holds." They as-

sert that his conduct during the summer has been a constant attempt to destroy the effectiveness of the Farmers' alliance as a body of reformers. They say that "his action has been utterly inexplicable to the friends of reform, both inside and outside the alliance, upon any theory of disinterested honesty of purpose."

Not satisfied with flouting Mr. SPRAGUE out, the committee jumps on Mr. SPRAGUE'S candidate with both feet. It says that Mr. GILMAN is repugnant to fully one-tenth of the rank and file of the alliance and that Mr. SPRAGUE knows it, and they furthermore assert that GILMAN'S political antecedents have inspired the great body of the farmers of this state with fear and distrust. It must be apparent to Mr. SPRAGUE and to his friend, Mr. GILMAN, by this time that when the Farmers' alliance is traded off to the man who makes the trade, it is not able to deliver the goods. It is a little too heavy a body for one man to lift.

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CHEERS FOR GEN. LOGAN

The Old Warrior and His Friends Given a Royal Reception in Minneapolis.

A Drive About the City and a Visit to the Battle of Atlanta.

The General Compliments the People of the Flour City on Their Enterprise and Prosperity.

A Magnificent Banquet Tendered by the Union League Club at the West Hotel.

Gen. John A. Logan, Gov. Alger of Michigan and the party of friends who have accompanied him on the trip from San Francisco, arrived at Minneapolis at 10 a. m. yesterday, and was met by a committee from the Union League, Hon. W. D. Washburn, Senator Langdon and others. Gen. and Mrs. Logan became the guests of Mr. Washburn of Fairbois, Gov. Alger and family of the North street residence. The balance of the party consisting of Col. and Mrs. J. Sumner Rogers, Col. and Mrs. Henry M. Duffield, Col. and Mrs. Aaron T. Bliss, Col. and Mrs. C. D. Long, Col. and Mrs. George H. Devens, Col. and Mrs. George C. Yemans, Mrs. A. P. Platt are quartered at the West hotel.

Luncheon was served at the West hotel, and a carriage drive about the city followed. At noon Gen. Logan visited the "The Old Warrior" of ATLANTA.

The management had been careful to exclude the crowd, and the platform was only moderately filled with spectators, who greeted the general upon his appearance with three cheers. To say that Gen. Logan's appearance in the city was a great event, putting it too mildly, he was enthusiastic, and insisted upon remaining a full hour examining the great painting in which, it will be remembered, he is shown as riding upon the great steamer, the "The Old Warrior" of the second division of the Fifteenth corps. There was only one point in the picture which he criticized as inaccurate, and that was the position of the Howard house, which he believed to have been on the left. He seemed to be thoroughly posted upon the positions of the forces, not only of the Union army, but the rebels as well, and gave the lecturer many valuable pointers, from his memory of the events of the day.

At the exposition yesterday had been set apart as Veterans' day and thousands of old soldiers were present from all portions of the state. The general was met by a committee from the Union League, Hon. W. D. Washburn and Capt. Gilmore, and the speaker's stand at the west extremity of the light well. A show of enthusiasm was manifested by the audience that filled the vast auditorium, accompanied by the clapping of hands and the waving of handkerchiefs. A line was almost immediately formed, and within the next thirty minutes Gen. Logan, accompanied by the general staff of the Fifteenth corps, stood at his side, occasionally introducing him to some acquaintance. The line passed rapidly in single file, and the show of enthusiasm was so great that the general suggested that the reception should be closed. There were cries of "Logan," "speech," from the audience, and in response Gen. Washburn stepped forward and said:

"If there is any class of people to whom the hearts of Minnesotans go with warmth it is to the veterans of the great civil war. I am glad to have you here, and I wish to extend to you a most hearty welcome. We have present with us to-night one who is not a stranger to the people of this state, Gen. John A. Logan, whom I hope will now address you for a few minutes."

Tuneful applause greeted the general as he came to the railing of the platform. When quiet had been restored, he said:

"It is very gratifying to me, and must be to the city of Minneapolis, to meet here so many of the people of Minnesota in examination of the many things on exhibition, showing such general interest and interest in the beauties of the West and the Northwest, and to assure you that in all my travel nothing has seemed to me so attractive and calculated to give me a better impression of the state of Minnesota as this exhibition, costing a quarter of a million of dollars which has been erected in the city of Minneapolis.
