ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE Kettle River Railroad Company.

The undersigned, citizens of the State of Minnesota, do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation for the purpose of forming a railroad corporation under the special laws of said state for the purpose of locating, constructing and operating a standard gauge railway in said state as hereinafter designated, and for the purposes hereinafter set out, and do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation, to-wit: ARTICLE FIRST. The name of this corporation is "The Kettle River Railroad Company." The general nature of its business is the location, construction and operation of a line of railroad connecting on the main line of the St. Paul and Duluth railroad at a point in the southwest quarter (SW 1/4) of section twenty (20), in the county of Pine, in said state, with the main line of the said railroad to Kettle River, in section ten (10), of said town and range, with an extension northwesterly up and across said river to the north line of township forty-two (42), of range twenty (20), of range twenty (20), and to operate the same with its locomotives, cars and appliances for the transportation of passengers and freight between the points herein specified in connection with the said St. Paul and Duluth railroad. The general office and principal place of the transaction of its business is the City of St. Paul, in the county of Ramsey, in said state. ARTICLE SECOND. The time of the commencement of this corporation is the twenty-first day of August, A. D. 1886, and the time of the continuance thereof is thirty (30) years. ARTICLE THIRD. The amount of the capital stock of this corporation is one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars to be paid in installments from time to time as may be required by resolution of the board of directors. ARTICLE FOURTH. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject is thirty per cent. of the amount of its capital stock. ARTICLE FIFTH. The government of this corporation and the general management of its affairs and business shall be vested in the board of directors; and the officers of this corporation shall be a president, secretary and treasurer, to be elected annually by the board of directors, who shall have such powers and perform such duties as the board of directors may prescribe. The directors shall be elected annually by the stockholders on the first Tuesday in June of each year, the board hereby constituted to remain in office until the first Tuesday in June, A. D. 1887, and until their successors are elected. ARTICLE SEVENTH. The number of the shares of capital stock of this company is one thousand shares of one hundred dollars each.
