PIPESTONE, Minn., Sept. 4.—The Democratic county convention held here today was very harmonious. The following delegates were elected: John Stewart and A. D. Ferris to attend the state convention; E. W. Davis and H. George to attend the congressional convention at Mankato. Five delegates were also elected to attend the senatorial and five the representative conventions. The sentiment of the convention was for Dr. Ames for governor and J. F. Shoemaker of Rock county for senator. No preference is shown for representative.

ACTIVE POLITICIANS. A Long List of Conventions to be Held at Eau Claire. Special to the Globe.

Eau Claire, Sept. 4.—A Democratic county convention to make nominations was called to meet in this city the 18th. No call has been made for the Democratic senatorial district nominating convention. The Republican senatorial district convention to nominate a candidate for state senator meets here Tuesday afternoon. Republican sentiment seems to have become centralized upon William A. Rust, the well known lumberman, for state senator, and probably he will be given the nomination by acclamation. Mr. Rust is identified chiefly with the Eau Claire Lumber company, but is largely interested in other corporations and is reputed to be a half-millionaire. He has been very active in shaking hands with the workingmen and in making most liberal propositions in aid of projected industrial enterprises intended to give employment to idle laborers, and, in a word, will make a hard-headed campaign. The prohibitionists yesterday called a convention to nominate a candidate for state senator, to be held here the 10th. The Republicans nominate a county ticket in convention here Monday afternoon and elect delegates to the senatorial and state conventions. The candidates for the offices are: Member of assembly, Hon. Thomas E. Williams, present incumbent; Syver E. Brim and William H. Smith, all of this city; for county clerk, Ald. J. E. Gilligan and Robert Sather of this city; for treasurer, Robert McLaren of Fairchild, Washington Church of Pleasant Valley and H. W. Knapp of this city; for sheriff, C. H. Dyer of Fairchild; for coroner, this city; for clerk of court, Henry McElin of Augusta; for district attorney, Henry Cousins, Judge George C. Tall, S. W. McCaslin, H. D. Cooley, R. E. Deolotte and Elmer E. Stanton, all of this city; for register of deeds, W. W. Jackson of Clear Creek, and A. W. Munge and John H. Young of this city; for surveyor, W. H. Lett of Fairchild; for superintendent of schools, Mrs. J. C. Sherwin, present incumbent.

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., Sept. 4.—The Prohibition county convention this afternoon embraced a good representation. There were sixty-four delegates present. Simons of Eau Claire; coroner, William O'Neill of Eau Claire. The delegates elected to the senatorial convention the 10th inst. are: Peter Truxav, Rev. W. A. McKillop, A. S. Hammond, F. R. Sebastian, D. McLeod, John Cabhan, William O'Neill and William Sutton.
