The Indian Commission Scores the Oeding of Some More Minnesota Indian Reservations.

Statistics Regarding Sales of Public Lands—The Figures for the New Northwest.

Indian Lands Ceded. LAKE WINNIBIGOSHIK, via Brainerd, Minn., Sept. 21.—The Indians of the Cass lake and Lake Winnibigoshik reservations met the United States Indian commission at Brainerd, Minn., and after a council of two days concluded negotiations with them, in which they cede their reservations to the United States, to be sold for their benefit, and they agree to remove to White Earth, as provided in the agreement made with the other tribes. The commission will leave to-day for Brainerd, and thence over the Milwaukee lake to confer with that band of Indians.

Over Twenty Million Acres Disposed of During the Fiscal Year. WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Commissioner Sparks, of the general land office, has prepared a statement showing the disposals of public lands for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1893, from which it appears that the total number of acres disposed of was 22,474, embracing an area of 20,991,967 acres. The amount of money received for this land was \$7,412,767. The cash sales aggregated 3,775,439 acres and the amount received therefor was \$3,727,891. Officially announced entries were made to the number of 61,683, covering an area of 9,145,135 acres. The lists of selections by the railroad companies under the different grants aggregate 2,311,337 acres. The number of TIMBER CULTURE ENTRIES made was 54,996, comprising 5,389,309 acres. The remaining area disposed of, consisting of military bounty land warrant locations, scrip locations, wagon road sections and agricultural college sections. Final p. of was made upon 19,356 homesteads, embracing 2,968,533 acres, and timber culture entries numbering 14,036 and covering an area of 141,994 acres. The above totals do not include the disposals of Indian lands, amounting to 15,363 entries, comprising an area of 1,132,596 acres, on account of which \$1,007,729 was received. The mineral entries numbered 1,935, covering 22,980 acres. The number of homestead entries committed to cash entries, covering 1,096,487 acres. This last area is not included in the total cash entries, as it was accounted for when the original homestead entries were made. Floyd, formerly agent for a local hospital, was in a questionable resort on Mill street last night, and after a quarrel with two men partially intoxicated forced their way into the house for the purpose of cleaning out the occupants. When they entered the apartment where Floyd was lying on a sofa a scuffle ensued in which Floyd drew a revolver and shot one of the intruders, John Bordahl, a laborer, the ball entering his right side. A Veteran Reunion. CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Sept. 21.—The First Iowa Veteran Volunteer Cavalry association has begun its second triennial reunion in this city. The day was given up to reviving acquaintances and making arrangements for the two succeeding days. At the reception of the speakers, a house re- sponded. Mayor Eaton's welcome was re- sponded to by Judge Stutsman, of Burlington. Gen. Thompson, of Bismarck, who was with the regiment from 1861 to 1866, spoke to the students of the Iowa State University. Past Grand Commander Burdette was the feature of the evening. Col. Bryan, of Des Moines, State Senator Kelly, of Kan- sas, and Chaplain Lozier followed. The regiment had 2,000 members, and 1,000 five years in the field. The survivors num- ber 400, of whom nearly all are here.

A Bishop Consecrated. MILWAUKEE, Sept. 21.—At Green Bay there was an immense attendance of people at the Green Bay cathedral to witness the consecration of Father Kater as bishop of the diocese. The pontifical throne was of ebony, velvet covered and gold lined, and surmounted by a magnificent canopy of gold, ornamented with rich damask hangings and heavy gold fringe and tassels. Around the pillars, over the doorways and across the entrance were strings of garlands of evergreen; the work of the ladies. The altar and chapels were covered with flowers and flowering plants, and the whole effect was beautiful, mellowed and softened by the light of wax candles. There was a procession to the church of church ecclesiastics, the bishop in full canonics, priests in ministerial vestments and societies in royal robes. The ceremony was a most imposing one. The bishop, Fr. Fischer, of La Crosse, preached the sermon and Archbishop Heiss, of Milwaukee, consecrated him.

A Quarter Centennial. MILWAUKEE, Sept. 21.—A quarter of a century ago to-day Der Herald was started by W. W. Coleman as the pioneer German daily Republican newspaper of Wisconsin. Mr. Coleman to-day received hundreds of congratulatory verbal and by wire. Twenty-five years ago Der Herald was printed on a Washington hand press as a diminutive sheet, with the chief purpose of counteracting the secession spirit here. To-day a Webb perfecting press was put in. It is now a large eight-page paper. Mr. Coleman was at first associated with Bernhard Domesche, one of the German pioneer editors of Wisconsin.

Wilson's Big Theft. The Company He Robbed Will Pay the Money. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21.—The directors of the Chesapeake & Delaware Canal com- pany to-day adopted a plan of assuming and providing for the issue of bonds by the absconding Treasurer J. A. L. Wil- son, who in June last, confessed to an embezzlement of \$600,000. The accounts are still at work on the books, and the exact amount will not be known until they have finished their task. The plan adopted is that presented by a committee of the board of directors, and is to assume and pay the fraudulent issue for which the company is legally liable on the following terms: We propose to pay the interest due July 1, 1893, of \$100,000 to the present holders of the loan to surrender their old certificates and to take in exchange as soon as they can the prepared new certificates in even sums of \$500 or \$1,000, respectively, negotiable by transfers upon their backs, and registered on some reliable trust company's, and scrip cer- tificates for the same amounts, convertible into bonds in sums of \$500 or \$1,000, said loan to run for a term of thirty years, drawing inter- est at 5 per cent. per annum from July 1, 1893, to the date of the present holders of the loan to surrender their old certificates and to take in exchange as soon as they can the prepared new certificates in even sums of \$500 or \$1,000, said loan to run for a term of thirty years, drawing inter- est at 5 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
