

AMONG THE HORSES.

The Great Glenview Sale of Trotting Stock Proves to Be a Grand Success. Two St. Paul Men Get a Couple of Good Ones and a Rochester Man Another.

The Sale Furnishes a Lesson for Minnesota Breeders to Profit From. Harry Wilkes and Oliver K.-Ald. Long's Belle F.-Dennis Ryan's Fine Trotting Stock.

The Great Glenview Sale. One of the most noted and important events in the history of the trotting horse in America occurred last week when the famous Glenview stud farm, together with its noted retinue of trotters, was sold.

The prices obtained for the stock were very large. The great Pancoast was bought by J. H. Schultz, of Brooklyn, for \$28,000. The horse was started at \$10,000, and was finally purchased by F. L. Stout, of Dubuque, Ia., for \$22,000.

Among the sales it is noticed that two gentlemen from St. Paul, each made a purchase. Mr. George W. Sherwood, of the Wheeling & Wisconsin sewing machine house, of Chicago, is interested in him in the purchase. Mr. Case will winter all of his horses at Glenview, but has not yet determined whether he will go into the breeding business or not.

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This connection it may be stated that J. L. Case, who has just purchased Glenview, will probably send the great Phallos to Kentucky next season.

John S. Rogers, the old trainer and driver, has gone to his long rest, and his remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery, Sunday afternoon last. He came here a lifetime ago, from California, with James L. Eoff, and the famous bay mare Princess, which was bred in the city by James L. Hamilton.

Local Horse Notes. Dennis Ryan has purchased at Balfour & Stebbins training stables that are full stables and by Star of the West. One of them, Jennie G., has a record of 2:34, and has been bred in the same stable as the other.
