RUMBLE OF THE RAILS.

A Railroad Project in the Northwest is Heavily Backed by English Capital. A Line Built to Connect the Manitoba Wheat Fields with the Markets of Europe. A Joint Freight Tariff Fixed by the Duluth and Northern Pacific Roads.

General Railway News Briefly Told for Ready Reading in Pithy Paragraphs. An Experimental Road. There is a railroad enterprise going on in the Northwest which is known to be well people, yet when it is completed it may prove of great importance.

The building of this stretch of road is not a wonderful piece of engineering, as the course lies across a perfectly level country. The road is being built by English capitalists, who give it out in a confidential way that they believe the road can be made to pay a satisfactory dividend.

The chief object in building the road is to bring the vast wheat fields of the Northwest into closer relationship with the European market, and to lower the cost of transportation. There are no richer wheat lands in the Dominion than those of the North-west along the Saskatchewan river, and there are millions of acres of it that are yet unexplored.

RED WING, Oct. 28.--The Duluth, Red Wing & Southern railroad has been incorporated to build a railroad from the northern terminus of the state to Red Wing, and thence to the northern boundary of Iowa. The incorporators are A. T. Stebbins, Rochester; F. W. Hoyt, T. B. Sheldon, S. B. Foote, W. F. Cross, Charles Beitcher and Peter Nelson. Red Wing; R. E. Munger, F. Thompson, W. S. Spaulding, F. W. McKenney, Duluth, and M. J. Toher, of Owatonna. The above named, with the exception of Mr. Cross, compose the first board of directors. The capital stock of the road is \$1,000,000. The directors will meet at St. Paul Nov. 11 to elect officers. It is intended to secure the right of way and proceed immediately to make the preliminary surveys.

Chips From the Fire. The last installment of about nine carloads, has been shipped from Oakland, Cal., for transportation over the Central, Union and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul. The whole shipment consisted of 50,000 seal-skins, the main portion having been shipped on Monday on Tuesday similar quantities, so that in all twenty-seven cars were filled. The cargo is valued at \$500,000. A circular announces that the Fremont, Elkhorn & Valley Railroad company has completed its line to Lincoln, Neb., and it was opened for business on the 25th inst.
