Smothered by the Storm.

The Real Estate Business Interfered With, But Still Buoyant.

Owing to the storm which swept over Minneapolis last week, business in real estate circles was somewhat dull and stagnant, all things considered.

Building operations were almost entirely suspended Tuesday and Wednesday, but will be continued again, just as soon as the weather permits. In many cases the workmen are under contract to finish these buildings before a certain time, and sooner than forfeit the money already due, will brave almost any weather.

MINOR DEEDS.

Among the notable sales of the week was the Heaton property, corner of Sixth street and First avenue south. Some years ago Mr. Heaton paid \$400 per foot, and has now sold the same to G. N. Merrim for \$800 per foot.

The building ordinance which has been under consideration by the council for some time has finally passed. The most important feature of the whole thing is the provision for fees for issuing building permits.

The ordinance restricts the height of business buildings to 125 feet, but this provision is not to be construed to include steeples, cupolas, pinnacles and towers. A jury composed of twelve unprejudiced men of Cook county returned a verdict in his favor for \$1,500.

the carrying capacity of floors. In business buildings shall be certified to by a competent architect, and the minimum carrying capacity is fixed at eight pounds to the foot. All buildings six stories in height or over must be fireproof, but iron shutters are not required for fireproof buildings as in the old ordinance.

The ordinance provides that plumbers must be licensed, and sets forth certain rules regarding the use of lead pipe.

Nicollet Island is undergoing a building boom, and many handsome residences and business blocks are going up.

In case a new house is built, it is probable that it will be erected by the L. M. Stewart property, corner of Fourth street and Hennepin avenue.
