Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing resolutions be spread upon the records and that a copy be sent to the bereaved widow, with our tenderest sympathy for her who for so many years labored beside our beloved commander as both wife and guardian angel.

Resolutions were also adopted thanking the committee on a soldiers' home appointed by the sixth annual encampment for their efficient labors in behalf of the object committed to its charge.

Complications That Arose Yesterday in the Quinns Election Contest--A Tangled Case. It is ever settled just who is legally entitled to act as coroner of Ramsey county for the term beginning last January, a very much mixed up case was untangled.

The proceedings in the contest, whereby Dr. Quinn is trying to unseat Dr. Markoe, took a very interesting turn yesterday, and one which adds new complications. The attorneys in the case are Messrs. Johns and Mann for Dr. Quinn, and O'Brien and Hurd for Dr. Markoe.

At this point in the game, the attorneys for Dr. Quinn rested their case. O'Brien and Hurd then moved to dismiss the contest on the ground that the contestant has not proved his case and that all the boxes should be counted by the referee and reported, and that the court had already held in this case that it could not be carried on piecemeal.

The court then reversed its former ruling and denied the motion to dismiss, holding that the contestant had made out a prima facie case. After this the referee, Dr. Markoe, introduced the county books to show that seventeen ballots were cast by inmates of the almshouse in Reserve township, and that they were not legal voters there.

The action yesterday was the refusal on the part of the court to try a motion to dismiss the case and the introduction of testimony to show that seventeen votes were cast by illegal voters. The tangled skein runs like this: Dr. Quinn's attorney applied for an order to have five boxes recounted. This was done and the result was a majority of fifty odd for Dr. Quinn.

Attorneys say that if Dr. Quinn's counsel now want to introduce the balance of the count made by the referees, having once rested their case, the court could admit them only by again reversing its decision.
