Reporting the passage of the following special law, viz:

AN ACT.

House File No. 297. To authorize the Board of Education of the City of St. Paul to issue its bonds to the amount of three hundred thousand (\$300,000) dollars, to aid in the erection of the public school buildings in said city.

erection of the public school buildings in said city.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota.

Section 1. That the Board of Education of the City of St. Paul is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and negotiate its bonds to the amount of three hundred thousand (\$300,000) dollars for the purchase of land and to aid in the erection of public school buildings in said city, provided, however, that no more than one hundred and fifty thousand (\$150-000) dollars of said bonds shall be issued in any one year.

any one year.

Sec. 2. Said bonds shall be of the denomination of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars each, with interest coupons attached, and shall be payable in not less than thirty (30) years after date, with interest at a rate not to exceed five (5) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually at the Financial Agency of the City of St. Paul, in the City of New York, and none of said honds shall be negotiated or sold by said Board for less than par.
Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in
Force from and after its passage.
Approved Jan. 31, A. D. 1887.

In this connection it was stated that this bill had been carefully prepared by the committee and the Corporation Attorney, but that since such preparation it had been learned that the bill had undergone still other changes of the substance of which the committee had only been informed by hear-say, and on which it had not been consay, and on which it had not been con-sulted; that the bill so changed had already passed in the senate and that in all proba-bility it would also pass the house, as the local delegation seemed to be all favorable to its passage.

The most radical change made in such

strange manner was said to be of section 3 of the bill, which prolongs the term of office of the present Board until the next city election in May, 1888, after which the membership is reduced to seven (7) inspectors, no longer to be elected by the people, but to be appointed by the mayor of the city, etc.

Report received and accepted.

Motives of delicacy proceedings.

Motives of delicacy precluding any de-bate on the question of the propriety of such change without even consulting those who had thus far served their constituents and worked in the common interest of all cheerfully willingly, and receiving or expecting no other reward than the consciousness of having faithfully performed their duty and executed a public trust to the best of their ability, the matter was not further commented upon, it being the general sentiment to leave it at the disposition of the local delegation without protest or argument on the part of the Board, its special committee or officers.
