Senator Cockrell Adopts a Rather Novel Mode of Investigating the Departments.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Senator Cockrell, of Missouri, said today, that it was likely that he would call a meeting one day this week of the committee appointed by the last congress to investigate the report upon the manner in which business is conducted in the various departments. "I shall not leave Washington for some time," said the senator, "and I propose to make the examination a most searching one. Every branch of the public service will be overhauled in a systematic manner, and wherever there can be any lopping off of useless employes, it will certainly be recommended." Apropos of this investigation, it is stated that the senator from Missouri is not a hunting victim, but a brass band, but is pursuing tactics peculiar to himself. Provided with a notebook and pencil, he makes it a point to visit a department and converse with the watchmen, laborers, messengers and clerks, whom he may meet in secluded corridors. Subsequently he jots down the result in his notebook, and thus he will be enabled to obtain a most accurate and positive and practical knowledge of the matter under consideration.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Commissioner Montgomery, of the patent office, is willing to remain until the 1st of May, if a suitable man to fill the office of commissioner of patents should not be found before then, but he is anxious to get away to his home in Michigan as soon after the 1st of April as it will suit the convenience of the president to relieve him.
