DENOUCED BY DANES.

Citizens From Denmark Incensed Over Bishop Foss' Address.

The Danes of the city are terribly torn up over the address of Bishop Foss before the orthodox ministers on Thursday (last night), and there is talk of a mass meeting to adopt resolutions expressive of their condemnation. Several prominent Danish citizens have called at the Globe office to protest against the statements contained in the bishop's little speech. Bishop Foss says he was incorrectly reported, but several ministers who were present corroborate the published statements.

The following letter from C. Neumann expresses the sentiments of the Danes on the matter:

Will you allow me on behalf of the Danish population to lay before the public a grievance, too great to be borne in silence? It is Bishop Foss's sermon in a lecture before the orthodox ministers of this city to stigmatize our old beloved home, Denmark, as "the most irreligious and immoral country in the world."

He has not hesitated to proclaim the Danish people as a nation of libertines, and huris an accusation in the face of our noble mothers, sisters and daughters that must make any woman blush with shame and indignation, and their male protectors clench their fists in impotent anger at the boldness and audacity of the count of the high standing, socially and ecclesiastically, of the person uttering the slander, of ever being able to call him to account for the same.

It is possible that a man in the high position of Bishop Foss, can to such extent throw aside all feelings of humanity, prudence, charity and justice, as to make a public charge of this kind, and to utter a judgment upon a nation as infamous as it is unjust, as idiotic as it is insulting.

How can the reverend gentleman lay on his tongue the words "irreligious and immoral" upon a people, and at night and sleep with such a load of calumny and injustice upon his conscience? How can he ever turn to his Creator with prayers and supplications for himself, his family and country as long as he boldly and unhesitatingly tramples upon the sacred honor of a nation. By what authority does he sit in judgment over a quiet, peace-loving, industrious people's morals? By what right does he revile the fair fame and good name of the daughters of one of the most enlightened people of the world?


