First—That no more than three (3) li-

censed vehicles aforesaid shall stand on or along each block, and when there standing as aforesaid, said vehicles shall stand apart from each other a distance of not less than fifty (50) feet. Second--All drivers of said vehicles shall

remain within ten (10) feet of his seat to the same vehicle, such vehicle remaining standing at any point or place as herein above provided. Third-All licensed vehicles shall have

the number of the same distinctly painted on the lamp or lamps thereon, if lamp or lamps are thereon; if not, then upon a conspicuous place upon the side of such vehicle.
Fourth—Any driver or owner of any such vehicle, who shall violate either or any of the provisions above mentioned shall be liable to an arrest, and if upon the trial thereof he shall be proven guilty, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred (\$100) dollars, and in addition to
