AN INNOCENT MAN IN PRISON. Singular Case in Which Circumstantial Evidence Led a Jury Astray.

There is a case recorded by the National Gazette of Berlin which will go far to shake public confidence in circumstantial evidence. Four years ago the wife of Albert Fiethein was discovered murdered. Robbery was not the object of the crime. Some 9,000 marks were left undisturbed. The husband was absent, or at least it so appeared. His wife had been testified together handsomely on the difference of religion. His wife was a Catholic and he was a Protestant and kept a mistress at Cologne. On account of his doubtful conduct the difference between himself and his wife the jury found that he was the only person who could have committed the crime. His wife had been testified that he had seen the husband of the wife strike her five times on the head. Fiethein was sentenced to death, but the emperor commuted his sentence to life labor for life. Fiethein's father did not believe in his guilt, and he has worked four years to discover the real murderer, and has finally succeeded. The murderer was a farm boy in a fit of drunkenness. He confessed, and upon subsequent arrest by the police he confessed his confession. He had first made advance to Fiethein's wife, she had threatened him with her husband's rod, and to escape this he killed her before he was aware of what he was doing. The innocent Fiethein will at once be released.

Austria's Popular Emperor. Long reigning Austria's emperor receives all comers who have applied to be received, and he receives them alone. Every applicant takes his turn. A master of the ceremonies opens a door, the visitor walks in and finds himself face to face with the emperor, who is unattended. The door closes, and the petitioner may say to the emperor what he likes. There is no chamberlain or secretary to intimidate him. The emperor stands in a plainly furnished study, in undress uniform, without a star or grand cord, and he greets everybody with the same friendly and unassuming gesture of the hand, which seems to say: "There is no ceremony here. Tell me your business, and if I can help you, I will do so. It is a truly imperial way of receiving. I impress everybody with the fatherliness of the emperor. The emperor of Austria has a penetrating eye and a quick catching glance. He is not a glance he makes people feel at home, and by a word he draws from them what they have to say. Then he gives his own views, and his own opinions, but generally with an acquiescing smile, and whatever he promises is faithfully performed. There is nothing petty or evasive in him. He is an arch who replies by "Yes" or "No," but always with so much courtesy that the humblest of his subjects receives from him a feeling of respect. He bows at the vouchsafes to ambassadors. A most lovable trait in him is that whenever he sees any body nervous at his presence he makes the audience last until, by his kind endearments, the nervousness has been completely dispelled. This sufficiently explains his majesty's extraordinary personal popularity, and the universal affection and loyalty of union between races which, but for an emperor like Francis Joseph, could not live together.

AN INNOCENT MAN IN PRISON. Singular Case in Which Circumstantial Evidence Led a Jury Astray.

There is a case recorded by the National Gazette of Berlin which will go far to shake public confidence in circumstantial evidence. Four years ago the wife of Albert Fiethein was discovered murdered. Robbery was not the object of the crime. Some 9,000 marks were left undisturbed. The husband was absent, or at least it so appeared. His wife had been testified together handsomely on the difference of religion. His wife was a Catholic and he was a Protestant and kept a mistress at Cologne. On account of his doubtful conduct the difference between himself and his wife the jury found that he was the only person who could have committed the crime. His wife had been testified that he had seen the husband of the wife strike her five times on the head. Fiethein was sentenced to death, but the emperor commuted his sentence to life labor for life. Fiethein's father did not believe in his guilt, and he has worked four years to discover the real murderer, and has finally succeeded. The murderer was a farm boy in a fit of drunkenness. He confessed, and upon subsequent arrest by the police he confessed his confession. He had first made advance to Fiethein's wife, she had threatened him with her husband's rod, and to escape this he killed her before he was aware of what he was doing. The innocent Fiethein will at once be released.

Austria's Popular Emperor. Long reigning Austria's emperor receives all comers who have applied to be received, and he receives them alone. Every applicant takes his turn. A master of the ceremonies opens a door, the visitor walks in and finds himself face to face with the emperor, who is unattended. The door closes, and the petitioner may say to the emperor what he likes. There is no chamberlain or secretary to intimidate him. The emperor stands in a plainly furnished study, in undress uniform, without a star or grand cord, and he greets everybody with the same friendly and unassuming gesture of the hand, which seems to say: "There is no ceremony here. Tell me your business, and if I can help you, I will do so. It is a truly imperial way of receiving. I impress everybody with the fatherliness of the emperor. The emperor of Austria has a penetrating eye and a quick catching glance. He is not a glance he makes people feel at home, and by a word he draws from them what they have to say. Then he gives his own views, and his own opinions, but generally with an acquiescing smile, and whatever he promises is faithfully performed. There is nothing petty or evasive in him. He is an arch who replies by "Yes" or "No," but always with so much courtesy that the humblest of his subjects receives from him a feeling of respect. He bows at the vouchsafes to ambassadors. A most lovable trait in him is that whenever he sees any body nervous at his presence he makes the audience last until, by his kind endearments, the nervousness has been completely dispelled. This sufficiently explains his majesty's extraordinary personal popularity, and the universal affection and loyalty of union between races which, but for an emperor like Francis Joseph, could not live together.
