William E. McGee, a colored woman living in a shanty on Eighth street, near Cedar, was sentenced to the work house for ninety days for assaulting Foo Gua, a neighboring Chinaman, with a hatchet.

Hugh Garrity, a Minneapolis gambler who tried to shoot Detective Kennedy yesterday to get out of the city, was brought up on a charge of disorderly conduct and released on payment of \$50 fine.
