The Minnesota & Northwestern Road Makes Another Heavy Cut.

The Milwaukee & St. Paul Will Not Advance Grain Rates.

President Hill, of the Manitoba, Pushing His Line in Montana.

Norquay Liable to Meet With Little Favor on Reaching Winnipeg.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—There is fear of trouble over Western and Northern freight rates. To-day the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road filed notice of its withdrawal from the Western organization, and this was followed by notice of withdrawal from the Northwestern organization by the Wisconsin Central. Both companies based their action on the Burlington & Northern going out, the St. Paul wishing to be in a position to make local rates to connect Bluffs and Omaha, providing the Burlington & Northern should lower the rates to Minneapolis and St. Paul. A meeting of general managers was called for next week to harmonize matters if possible, but a majority of the officials are of the opinion that a period of demoralization is ahead. The Rock Island, through its controlled line, the Minneapolis & St. Louis, has filed notice that at the end of fifteen days it would reduce the rate on cotton piece goods from Chicago to Minneapolis & St. Paul from 50 cents to 30 cents per hundred pounds. The Milwaukee & St. Paul, which is a member of the association, at once put into effect the reduced rate, and all Chicago and Minneapolis lines at once followed. Cotton piece goods, including bags and bagging, are being advanced by all of the cheaper cotton manufactured articles, is one of the most important commodities carried, and gives more revenue to the lines than any other class of merchandise. It is claimed that the Rock Island has made contracts with Minneapolis mills at the lower rates.

No Advance in Grain Rates. It was said a few days ago that the Milwaukee & St. Paul had given the required ten days' notice of an advance in grain rates from points below St. Paul and North of La Crosse, and west of the Mississippi river, to 1 1/2 cents per 100 pounds. This action was criticized as being in violation of section 4 of the interstate commerce law. The officials of the Milwaukee & St. Paul now claim that its intentions were misconstrued. They say it was their intention to advance the rate from points east of St. Paul to Chicago above the rate charged from those points. Their intention was to advance the rate simply applied on grain and analogous articles from points north of La Crosse and west of the Mississippi river to St. Paul and Minneapolis. However, this may be, the proposed advance will not be made and the rates on grain from all points east of St. Paul and Minneapolis will remain at 7 1/2 cents per 100 pounds.

Mr. Hill in Montana. Special to the Globe. GREAT FALLS, Mont., Sept. 30.—Having aided in the celebration of the arrival of the Manitoba track at Benton yesterday, President Hill and party came to Great Falls and spent this morning visiting the site of the Missouri, Giant Spring and other attractions. This evening they returned to Benton. The party consists of Messrs. Hill, Mantel, Egart, Lyman, Metcalf and James; Misses Hill, Gotzian and Manvel and Mrs. James. They were met here by Col. Broadwater, president of the Montana central. The building of the Manitoba is now completed to Great Falls, and the track was within thirty-six miles last night. It will reach this city on Oct. 12. The branch to the Sand Coulee coal mines is being located, and the construction will commence next week.

The Minnesota & Northwestern. Work on the track of the Minnesota & Northwestern between Freeport and Dubuque is being pushed along as rapidly as possible. Men are at work at different points on the tunnel, which was advanced one hundred feet last week. The company expects to have trains running through it by the middle of January. On the southwestern extension from Des Moines to Kansas City, about 80 per cent. of the grading has been completed and track laying has now progressed about forty miles from Des Moines and goes forward at the rate of two and a half miles a day.

Another Cut. The Minnesota & Northwestern keeps cutting and slashing into the freight rates at a terrific rate. Some months ago it made a general and sweeping reduction that made a wide and deep howl, but they all came to the rate though. A few days ago it caused another surprise by cutting the rate on cotton piece goods twenty cents. Now the same road makes a further cut in merchandise rates between Chicago and Minneapolis and St. Paul. This road seems to be the great equalizer among all the other roads for freight between St. Paul and Chicago, and the indications are that still further cuts will be made.

The Milwaukee & St. Paul. The Kansas City extension of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road will be opened for freight business to St. Joseph next week. A few cars have been sent in, but the regular operation will not begin until the time mentioned. The extension to Kansas City will be ready Oct. 15, but will probably not be opened for freight business until Nov. 1. Passenger trains will be put on later, and the extension will be in full operation by Dec. 1.

Chips from the Ties. The Minneapolis & St. Louis road claims all the credit for the cut of 20 cents on tie piece stuff, announced by the Minnesota & Northwestern. The Minneapolis & St. Louis people say that they notified the chairman of the Board of the Minnesota & Northwestern Sept. 26 to that effect, and also gave shippers here in Minneapolis and St. Paul notice of the cut, and that when the Minnesota & Northwestern people found this cut they issued out of their own in order to gain all the credit.

The New York Financier says it is probable that the Union Pacific will back the Duluth, Hibon & Denver road in order to build a line from San Francisco to Duluth, 200 miles shorter than Chicago.

The Minot extension of the Manitoba west to Great Falls, has just reached Fort Benton, Mont., where there was a celebration. On this occasion Mrs. J. H. Hill drove a silver spike.

The falling off in the earnings of the Milwaukee & St. Paul road is attributed to the fact that the grain shipments are so much smaller, owing to the wet weather.
