"Jeff's Cab Line" Has Been Sold Out and the Proprietors Have Gone.

Ramsey County Lawyers Pay Tribute to the Late Judge Palmer's Memory.

Tr. J. H. Gieske Makes Rather Large Requests in the Line of City Offices.

Summary of the Doings of One Day Gathered From All Sources.

TOOK EVERYTHING IN SIGHT. The Proprietors of "Jeff's Cab Line" Take Their Goods and Chattels and Are Gone.

A half dozen excited men stood about a red and white sign announcing the office of "Jeff's Cab Line" in front of No. 156 East Third street last night. Across the street was another little group, equally excited, and down on the Merchants hotel corner another. They were all talking about the same thing, and in language which might be called profane.

The men who had caused all this commotion were Thomas Conody and James Merrill, who had been doing business as proprietors of "Jeff's Cab Line" for the last eight months, with an office in the saloon of Murphy & Reber, next door to the Merchants hotel.

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"Jeff's cab line" consisted of five hansom cabs and one motor and the horses to operate them. The line was sold yesterday morning to a man named White from Minneapolis, and a St. Paul real estate man named Merrill.

Merrill was paid \$1,600 in cash. It is rumored that some of the stock was mortgaged, but the gentlemen were making a grand cleanup. Yesterday morning they made no difference. Conody had a family and Merrill had his brother-in-law.

Conody's family moved out of the house which they were living on Eighth street last night, and Friday afternoon Conody sold all the household furniture.

They owed four drivers and two stablemen for the last two weeks a total of over \$100. They also owed Murphy & Reber \$10 for rent, and the returns are not all in yet. The police have been notified and will watch them and they will be brought back if found.

A MOST JUST JUDGE.

Members of the Ramsey County Bar Pay Tribute to the Memory of the Late Judge Palmer.

The members of the Ramsey-county bar assembled in the district court yesterday morning at 10 o'clock to pay tribute to the memory of the late Judge Palmer, who died recently in Florida.

There were present, besides those mentioned in the full bench of the court: Judges Wilkin, Simons, Briegleb and Kelly. When court was opened by the sheriff, Judge Flaudrau rose and read a prepared memorial, reciting in modest and appropriate words the life and labors of the deceased judge.

He had come to the bench at a time when the practice here was in a chaotic state and had made his rules at that time with the soundest discretion, and had always conducted himself as a man of honor, integrity and ability.

C. N. Bell, the former law partner of the deceased, read a memorial prepared by himself. He paid a glowing tribute to the character of his departed friend.

H. J. Horn said that the name of Judge Palmer could be pointed to as being in the very front ranks of his profession. His name should be cherished by the young men of the bar as an example of what may be done by industry and endeavor.

J. V. D. Heard and J. J. Egan also spoke in high terms of the deceased. The Rev. W. J. D. Haupt, pastor of the church in Palmer's office as a student. "I wish," said he, "not as an expression from the bench he occupied and adorned, but as a student, to pay tribute to his memory. I knew him to esteem him. He was conservative in action and habit of thought. He was cautious in his methods, wise in his judgments, safe in counsel. He was a man of spotless integrity, a just man who feared God and hated evil practices."

MAKES A MODEST REQUEST.

J. H. Gieske Gives His Idea of a Proper Division of the City Offices—Promises From the Mayor.

A lively meeting of the Ninth Ward German-American Citizens' union was held at Stahl's hall, Rice and Charles streets, last evening. After the transaction of routine business, of which there was little, the audience, which included many not members of the union, settled down to listen to an harangue by J. H. Gieske, member of the central committee of the German-American clubs. He was firm in the belief that seven German-Americans should wear the title of alderman. He would be satisfied with two members at large and one each from the Third, Fourth and Ninth wards, Dayton's bluff and the West side.

Further he declared that the nomination for mayor should be exacted a promise to give the German-Americans adequate representation on the board of education in order that the methods have a reasonable assurance that the teachers of the German language in the public schools will continue. He also wanted a promise exacted from the candidate for mayor to deal liberally with the schoolists in the matter of Sunday closing. He states that to the central body had been submitted a copy of the platform of the Socialistic Labor party, and declared that the German-Americans had no use for platforms of any kind. He proposed that the members of the assembly and trades unions in hearing up money in their treasuries, declaring that the members would be better off were they to divide such funds pro rata. As a whole Mr. Gieske's address was, to put it mildly, a violent appeal to the national prejudices of the Germans.

IN MEMORY OF LOUIS FISHER.

The Tribute of the Club to Which the Dead Journalist was President.

The Press club committee, appointed to prepare a memorial upon the death of its president, Louis E. Fisher, has submitted the following:

On March 5, 1888, Louis E. Fisher, president of the St. Paul Press club, and a journalist of more than forty years' honorable and unblemished service, died at the ripe age of sixty-seven years. Profoundly impressed with a sense of the bereavement it has sustained and desirous of transmitting a memorial of its appreciation of his eminent worth, this club places on its records this tribute to his memory.

Louis E. Fisher came to Minnesota in 1854, and was henceforward, until about the last day of his life, constantly employed in the offices of St. Paul newspapers. Rising in his profession from his humblest seats to that of editor-in-chief for several years of a leading daily journal—each position found him amply qualified by natural gifts and abundantly equipped by solid acquirements to perform all its exacting duties. A PATRIARCH'S WORDS.

Capl. Peter Berkey Addresses the St. Paul Real Estate Board.

REAL ESTATE HERE IS SOLID.

The Venerable Banker Advises All to Salt Their Spare Cash in Corner Lots.

At the regular meeting of St. Paul real estate board yesterday morning reports were received from the various special committees and Capt. Charles S. Bunker was elected a member. Several large sales were reported as made during the past week by members, and some large ones promised for next week.

Capl. Peter Berkey was present and made the following remarks: "I cannot talk to you much. I received an invitation to come here and nothing was said about talking. I am not much of a talker, but by the way, I came here thirty-five years ago. Money was worth then from 5 to 5 per cent. I loaned money at that time at 4 per cent, and paid 3 per cent for it. All my spare money—all I had above what was required to carry on my business—I was in the real estate. I put in real estate, and some men claim that I am among the few men who do not believe in extending credit to real estate men. If there is any one thing I believe in more than anything else, it is real estate. I have real estate to-day that has paid me more than 5 per cent per month from the time I purchased it until now. I could have made more money at 4 per cent, but I preferred to put it in real estate. Now if there is any one thing that has helped the growth of St. Paul, the permanent growth of St. Paul, it is non-resident investments, and it is to those men who years ago made wise and judicious investments for non-residents that we owe a large percentage of our success. Sell property to non-residents—they can talk for you abroad. There is not anything more legitimate than real estate transactions. I don't mean booming up and having nothing to boom. You have got something here. I would rather have good real estate to-day than bank stocks. An one of the kind of men who believe in buying and holding. That way of thinking, I am afraid, does not improve the agents' business. I say put all

YOUR SPARE MONEY into corner lots if you can, I want non-residents to buy property. That's what is more than anything else. Of course we have laid out a good deal of territory, but you can realize how rapidly we have to grow, for the reason that we are a railroad center. There is not a man in this room who can not estimate the amount of property that is required for railroad purposes. There is not a railroad man who can not anticipate what a man has made his calculations large enough for railroad purposes. Our railroad men don't know to-day how much room they will need for their business. I have known something of railroads for a great many years. I built the road from here to Stillwater and Hudson about seventeen years ago. The city was up in arms because I wanted four tracks down then, when they now have thirty or forty. A gentleman said to-day: 'We must increase 75,000 this year if we stop. That is, if we have no boom.' That means we double our population in ten years, and that's no growth at all. We have not commenced manufacturing yet. Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis; I can remember when there was no manufacturing done in either of these. We shall grow as fast as any of them, and that is the fact. I do not think any man, if he will stop and think a moment, will gainsay it. What is to prevent your real estate from growing better?
