FIREMEN GET THE EARTH.

Their day at the Big Minneapolis Exposition.

AN EXCITING TOURNAMENT.

Those Who Captured Prizes.—Yesterday at the Show.—Varied Notes. Firemen's day drew one of the oldest crowds to the exposition. The parade of the visiting fire companies occurred at 1 o'clock, and proved to be an imposing sight, the bright uniforms of the laddies making the scene an animated one. No better drilled and equipped companies of volunteers have appeared in the Northwest. The following was the order of march up Hennepin and down Nicollet to the exposition: Platoon of Police. Captain's Seventh Regiment Band. Committee in Charge. Fire Department Officers and guests. Detail of City Fire Department. Old Volunteers. Sank Center Fire Department. Irving Fire Department. Fargo Fire Department. Moorhead Fire Department. A luncheon was spread at East Minneapolis, of which the firemen partook with a relish, and then came the exciting contests on University avenue. The intense heat, the large audience patiently sweated until the last race was over. First came the horse race, between the Continentals and Yerkas, the Continentals made it in 50 1/2 seconds, very good time. The Yerkas were not on hand owing to some misunderstanding, but afterwards ran over the ground and were given second money.

Two superb fast passenger elevators carry passengers up and down the building, and another elevator is used exclusively for freight. Change carriers, run by electricity, connect every floor with the cashier. At the opening yesterday afternoon the store was packed by one of the most fashionable crowds of shoppers ever brought together in Minneapolis.

As one entered the main door of the store on a balcony in the rear, propped up with rare plants, in which were stationed Danz's orchestra, which discoursed the sweetest music. This balcony is to be used as a ladies' waiting and reception parlor. At night, when brilliantly illuminated by electricity, the effect was even more pleasing, and the great store was the center of attraction all evening.
