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MILITIA MARKSMEN.

The third annual tournament of the Minnesota National Guard Rifle association will commence Tuesday, Sept. 25, at Fort Snelling, and continue four days. The opening day will be devoted to a bull's-eye match, and will also witness the commencement of all the other continuous matches of 300 yards. The reserve match of the second day is open only to commissioned officers of the national guard, and each competitor will have five shots at 300, 500 and 600 yards. Company teams of six men will also shoot at 300 and 500 yards, and the individual match of seven shots each at 200, 500 and 600 yards for the Skinner badge will close the second day's sport. The third day is devoted to up to date and improved matches. An individual match of ten shots each at 300 and 500 yards on "A" target and ten shots at 500 and 600 yards on "B" will usher in the last day, and the interstate match for the Washburn trophy, valued at \$500, which has been contested for but once and won by Minnesota, promises to be an interesting finale of the meeting.
