There Rests the Bill to Exclude the Incoming Mongols.

He Is Holding It Out of Courtesy to the Senate

Important Action of the Majority of the Indian Traderships Committee.

A Bill Submitted Before Half of the Testimony Was Taken.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—At the meeting of the committee on foreign relations of the senate this morning, the Canadian retaliation bill was referred to a sub-committee after an informal discussion of it. Senator Edmunds was instructed to report to senate an order withholding the Chinese exclusion bill until the committee shall have an opportunity to examine it and its effect on existing treaties and relations.

The Majority of Senator Chandler's Committee on Indian Traderships Submits a Bill Before the Testimony Is All in.

First—That no sale of pine timber from the reserved lands should be allowed to be made by any Indian before his allotment is made. Second—That no further sale of pine timber be allowed until rules and regulations specifically prescribed the conditions of such sales and adequately protecting the Indians.
