CHIT CHAT CORNER.

Teachers' Institutes—State Fish Hatcheries—Evening Schools—A Vigilant Deputy—Puzzled High School Pupils—Not in the Play.

Prof. Kirk, of the state department of public instruction returned from Hastings yesterday afternoon, where he addressed a large meeting of teachers attending the institute being held there this week.

The state fish hatcheries near Pipe's Eye have been fairly successful during the present year, under the supervision of S. S. Watkins, superintendent, and Robert O. Sweney, president of the board of management.
