J. J. McCarty read the following report on city and county affairs, which he referred to the proper committee. The report set forth substantially that: The special laws of 1881, chapter 287, required the sheriff, clerk of the district court, register of deeds, abstract clerk, city treasurer and city controller and auditor to "keep a proper record book showing all the times the services performed by them and charges for such services, the daily money receipts for their respective offices from salaries and from fees and from other sources."

The sheriff's records are not required by the law.
