

"ON AN IRISHMAN"

A Republican Roorbach Turned to Crow.

THE TRIBUNE EATS IT.

The Straits to Which the Republicans of Minneapolis Seem to Be Reduced.

Of all the contemptible tricks to which desperation has reduced a party, that sprung by the Tribune last Friday was the most despicable. It made charges it knew it could not sustain, and which it was compelled to swallow the next morning. The charge was against P. B. Winston, but it struck the wrong man and has reacted accordingly. The publication was as follows:

THE LIE. As the day for election approaches the evidence against Mr. Philip B. Winston as a man qualified to hold the position of mayor of Minneapolis increases, and the revelations concerning his treatment of the workmen are of such startling character as to preclude the possibility of his getting much support from the labor organizations of this city. Yesterday O. J. Foss, chairman of the Republican county committee of Granite Falls, Minn., was in the city, and made an affidavit to a little circumstance that occurred near this city last July, which illustrates how far an analysis of Mr. Winston's record will justify the frequent assertion that he is the workingman's friend. The affidavit was sworn to by Mr. Foss before George H. Waite, notary public of Hennepin county, and witnessed by Charles A. Brown. The full text is as follows:

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 1, 1888.—O. J. Foss, residing at Granite Falls, Minn., declare that on or about the end of July or the first day of August, in the year 1888, a man, whose name I do not now recall, working in a crew of Shepherd, Winston & Co., while they were building the William & Sioux Falls branch of the Manitoba railroad, had one arm and thigh broken by the slipping over of a wagon load of ties which he was hauling from the cars to a point below, and that one Thomas and one by the name of Yellow drove the said man in their wagon to Granite Falls and took him to Dodge's hotel, where Mr. Winston was stopping at the time. Mr. Winston was present when the said man was brought in, and when asked if a doctor should be summoned, replied: "Oh, he is an Irishman, you need not bother about him; he will get well anyhow." Further, I affirm that the man has been confined to his room most of the time since the accident, and has not at any time since then,

and is not now able to perform a full day's work. Signed, O. J. Foss.

Next morning the Tribune published the following retraction: "O. J. Foss, chairman of the Republican county committee of Granite Falls, Minn., published in the Tribune an affidavit regarding an accident to a man employed by Shepherd, Winston & Co. at Granite Falls, Minn., which he charged that Mr. Winston acted inhumanely toward the man and said of him at the time, 'Oh, he is only an Irishman; you need not bother about him; he will get well anyhow.'" The following statement from Dr. E. A. Abbott, the well known physician of St. Paul, are offered in direct refutation of the charge of Mr. Foss's affidavit: "St. Joseph's Hospital, St. Paul, Nov. 2, 1888. I was called to attend to a man, Aug. 2, while driving a team for Shepherd, Winston & Co. near Granite Falls, Minn., the load tipped over and the timber fell on me in such a manner as to break my right arm and leg. I was taken to a hotel in Granite Falls and a doctor sent for by Shepherd, Winston & Co., who set the broken limbs within an hour of the time of the accident. A cot was furnished and on the 11th I was taken by train to St. Paul, and by train to this hospital, where Dr. Abbott met me, and has been in attendance ever since. A man was sent with me all the way from Granite Falls, Minn., to St. Paul, and I was in charge of the work (he was in my place to help me as he is paying my expenses and the hospital and furnishing one of the best doctors in the city. If I had a chance I should love for P. B. Winston as the friend of the laboring man. OLE NISS.

STATE OF MINNESOTA, ss. COUNTY OF HENNEPIN, ss. I, E. J. Abbott, being duly sworn, say: I was called upon Aug. 3, 1888, by Mr. P. B. Winston, of the firm of Shepherd, Winston & Co., who stated that one of their men had been hurt at Granite Falls, Minn., and would arrive at St. Paul the next day. He requested me to take charge of him on his arrival and do all that might be necessary. The man, Ole Niss, arrived Aug. 4, and was taken to St. Joseph's hospital. On examination I found that the broken bones had been properly set and dressed. He has been under my care since that time. He is still at the hospital, and all his expenses are being paid by Shepherd, Winston & Co. E. J. ABBOTT, M. D. Subscribed and sworn to before me this 2d day of 1888. A PLEASING ADDRESS.

What Miss Eva McDonald Said at the People's Theater.

The speech of Miss Eva McDonald at the People's theater Thursday evening last, which created so much favorable comment, is as follows:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: "I come before you in a somewhat novel position to voice the sentiments of women in a somewhat better manner than we usually speak upon industrial questions, yet the question upon which I wish to speak has close relation to the social and moral problems of the day. Coming from the class to which many of my hearers belong—the wage-workers—I have become convinced that to us the school question is an important one. In this country we have a school system of which we are justly proud, and which has been reared upon the broad basis of an equal opportunity to all, regardless of creed, race or color, and which rests upon the sympathy with their constant advancement. It has been found that women make the most successful teachers, and that they are in ready and willing cooperation with the superintendent and directors, but only that of a general public, in that they may do their work efficiently and intelligently. For this reason the women of Minneapolis have resolved to appeal to public sentiment to sustain them in putting upon the school board one of their own sex in order to voice their sentiments, for there are many points connected with the management of schools which require the judgment and direction of a woman. The women of Minneapolis, true to the progressive spirit of the city, have determined to let their influence be felt in the schools, and they appeal to every citizen to make their first effort a success. When we remember that many of our social and industrial evils spring from ignorance it becomes a duty for all true men and women to do everything in their power to put their school system upon a plane where it will be a benefit to all classes, and strike at the root of the present evil which threaten society. We must remember that the little school boy of to-day is the citizen of the future, and holds in his hand the destinies of our country, and the school girl of to-day will be the mother of the coming generation, and her education depends upon the training and development of the coming generation, and the women of Minneapolis appeal to all of their own sex, and to every true citizen, to help them in their effort to make our system one which will be a credit not only to the city, but to the whole country.
