ONE WAY TO WALK. One of the most important propositions to be made to the legislature of 1889 will be that for an increase of taxation. The increase asked for will probably be one mill. The basis for the demand will be upon the growth of the state, increase of official business, and, in consequence, increase of official expenses. It ought to be hardly necessary to call the attention of the Democratic members of the legislature to the course they should pursue toward this. The last state platform of the Democracy arraigned the Republican party for extravagance in state affairs and pledged Democracy's best efforts to financial reform. If the present tax rate (increased 1-13 mills since 1885) is not sufficient to meet the state expenses, there should be a rigid cutting down of salaries, a reduction of the official force and a diversion into the public treasury of money now passing into the pockets of private individuals. The fees of the oil inspector, of the governor's private secretary, and the large surpluses credited to various state institutions can, by a little reform legislation, be made the property of the state. The careful avoidance of the passage of bills as nefarious as House File 157 will insure greatly to the benefit of the treasury, as will also increased taxation upon certain corporations.

LABOR ALL RIGHT. CHAUNCEY DEWEY and his professional shadow, JAMES G. BLAINE, are sending information into the West to the effect that the labor vote of the East won HARRISON'S victory. It would be well to remember that the reports did not disprove their assertions. The great anthracite region of America consists of the counties of Carbon, Columbia, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Northumberland and Schuylkill, in high tariff Pennsylvania. There the vote is essentially that of labor, and represents the sentiments of bread-winners, not millionaires. In 1887 these counties gave 100,000 votes for Grover Cleveland in 1888, after the tariff reduction agitation these same counties gave 4,600 majority for CLEVELAND, a Democratic gain of 7,000. We shall find, as the days pass, that this has been the case in a majority of the labor centers of the United States, and that if Republican success had been staked upon that vote it would have been a Democratic triumph.

CABINET GUESSING. Cabinet making is the favorite amusement of the politicians since the election, and as it is an innocent sort of pastime, there can be no harm in giving them full sway. A number of gentlemen will be honored by assigning them to places in the cabinet in advance of President HARRISON'S inauguration which will never be thought of afterwards. It is singular, however, how many of the cabinet makers are disposed to put Mr. Blaine in the cabinet, and that there should be such concurrence of opinion among them at this point excites suspicion that there is method in it. It is possible that the president elect, through his friends, is thus paying the way to reconcile public disappointment in case Mr. BLAINE should not be invited to become premier of the new administration. When Mr. Blaine was elected in 1880 the fact that Mr. BLAINE was to be made secretary of state was accepted as a part of the result of the election, and no other name was canvassed in connection with the position. When Mr. BLAINE came home last summer and assumed leadership of his party it was likewise accepted by the public that he was to have the highest post of honor in the HARRISON administration in case the Republicans carried the election. If the Chicago convention had expressly named him as the choice of his party for the post of secretary of state, it could not have been more definitely understood that he was during the campaign. And that the cabinet had been composed of the American people, that he was to hold the post of honor in the HARRISON administration, was never questioned until the campaign was closed and the election was over. Now it is rung on

every side that Mr. BLAINE is to be shelved, and either Mr. DEWEY or Senator SHERMAN invited to accept the state portfolio, and from a quarter of the globe come loud and long, and from Gen. HARRISON'S own home. What does it mean? Is it to be, as the GLOBE suggested before the election, that Mr. BLAINE is to be humiliated by the junior HARRISON as Mr. CLAY was snubbed by the elder HARRISON in 1840? A better man and a greater party leader than ever JAMES G. BLAINE could hope to be was then sacrificed on the altar of the HARRISON egotism and selfishness. So it is possible that the HARRISON trait may again predominate.

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THE HELMET OF DEATH. Physicians Propose a Plan for Killing Instant Results Secured. Criminals Who Consume to Exist as Soon as a Baton Should Be Touched. New York World. The November meeting of the Medical-Legal society at the Buckingham hotel was unusually interesting, as the prizes for successful essays were awarded and the report of the committee appointed to devise the best means of killing criminals by electricity was read. Last spring the society, through several of its members, offered three prizes for the best essays on subjects that the society was interested in. Ten essays were handed in, and during the past six months the committee, consisting of Drs. J. M. Davis, ex-judge John F. Dillon, Dr. Stevenson, Dr. Stephen Smith and Edward Chamberlain read them all, and last night the prizes were awarded. John H. Wigmore, of the Boston bar, was the author of the first prize of \$100, given by Col. Elliott F. Shepard, for his essay entitled, "Circumstantial Evidence in Poison Trials;" to the second prize, of \$75, went John H. Jones, of the New York bar, for his essay, "Insanity as a Defense in the Charge of Murder;" and to the third prize of \$50, went Dr. J. M. Davis, of the New York bar, for his essay, "Insanity in Its Relation to Infanticide."
