

HARRISON HAUNTED.

Spillmen of Large and Small Caliber Importune Him for Office.

Wisconsin Puts Gen. Payne in the Field for Postmaster General.

Wolverines Would Like to See Gen. Alger in Edict's Shoes.

The Question Arises, Are There Enough Positions to Go Around?

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 1.—The president-elect's visitors to-day included several gentlemen of political prominence. Among the first callers this forenoon were four congressmen from Wisconsin, Robert L. Follette, J. B. Caswell, O. B. Thomas and Nels Haugen. They had a long conference with Gen. Harrison. From one of the visiting congressmen it is learned that when the conversation drifted around to politics they intimated that if the president-elect was disposed to select a member of his cabinet from Wisconsin they would like to offer a suggestion as to who they believed it would afford the people of that state the greatest satisfaction to see chosen. The suggestion, however, was not asked for and was not offered. The congressmen are unwilling to say plainly who their choice is, but their conversation leaves the impression that Gov. Rusk is the man they would like to see recognized. While they all speak in high praise of Gov. Rusk, it comes from a very good source that their real candidate is Gen. Payne, the Wisconsin member of the national republican committee and former postmaster of Milwaukee, whose friends are quietly pressing him for postmaster general. It is asserted now that it was a part of Sen. Follette's mission the other day when he stopped en route from New York to Chicago to cordially endorse and recommend Payne's selection in the event of a...

PORTFOLIO FELL TO WISCONSIN. The congressional party left for Washington this evening. Senator Palmer and the congressmen arrived at the Hotel Michigan, arrived toward noon, and had not been in the New Denison hotel but a little while before Gen. Harrison walked in and cordially shook hands with the distinguished Wolverines and invited them to lunch with him. The weather being pleasant, they walked the entire distance to the general's residence and remained with him the greater part of the afternoon. About 4:30, accompanied by Gen. Harrison, they walked back to the hotel, and the general, after chatting some time with Col. Breland, Mr. Ryan and other friends, leisurely strolled homeward. Senator Palmer was one of Gen. Harrison's personal friends during his term in the senate. Speaking to the press representatives about his visit, he declared it was entirely social, that he had no axe to grind and did not come with a view of talking politics at all. He spoke in terms of high personal admiration for Gen. Harrison. The senator was not inclined to talk upon the cabinet and could in no way speak for Gen. Alger, and did not know whether Gen. Alger desired or would accept a cabinet position, but if Michigan was to be represented on the national board of directors he thought...

GEN. ALGER WAS THE MAN. Ex-Congressman Horr, celebrated for his genial treatment of news-gatherers, would not select senators or congressmen for his cabinet, as there are enough prominent and able Republicans outside from whom to select. The humorous statesman would not for a moment seriously consider the suggestion that he himself might be invited into the cabinet, and vigorously declared that if any one from Michigan went into the cabinet, it ought to be, and in his opinion would be, Gen. Alger. When his attention was called to the published interview with Gen. Alger some two weeks ago, where he is made to say that he doesn't desire and would not accept a cabinet position, Mr. Horr said he had not heard of such an interview, and he knew that it could not be correct. This statement, by one so close to Gen. Alger, revives the consideration of his name as a very probable member of President-elect Harrison's cabinet. Indeed there is scarcely another name on the list of cabinet possibilities that is more generally mentioned than that of Gen. Alger for the war portfolio. In view of his inability to even acknowledge the personal notes of many letters and telegrams, the general again desires to cordially thank his congratulators through the press, and request them to kindly accept the with the best. Five Hundred Harrisonians Eat, Drink and Make Merry. Special to the Globe.


New York, Dec. 1.—The Republicans of this city gave a jubilee dinner to-night at the Metropolitan hotel. Over 500 invitations were issued and fully that number of guests were present. On the walls in the main dining room, where the banquet was spread, were the portraits of the president and vice president-elect of the United States. The President of the Republican League, James P. Foster, presided. There were no set speeches, but the guests called upon by the chairman made a few remarks, touching mainly on the issues of the late campaign. Among those present were Thomas C. Platt, ex-Judge Noah Davis, Hon. Frank H. Hooper, H. R. Thurber, Gen. Joseph C. Jackson and Alfred R. Conkling. Senator Quay, Warner Miller and Chauncey M. Depew expected to have been present, but were unable to attend. Mr. Foster called the assembly to order, and complimented the Republicans on their organization. He reviewed the principles and achievements of the Republican league, and declared that it would be ever true to the party. He congratulated the party upon the national victory, and said it was the result of loyalty to the nation. At the polls would forever exclude those attempting it from the party. 




