Christmas is here. Beyond a doubt the day has come and brought the realization of anticipations that have been spread backward over a period of weeks. All of the hopes and joys of that long stretch of time have entered and fulfilled in this one day, the crowning epoch of the "sweet season."

The Christmas tree festivities and entertainment of St. John's Episcopal Mission Sunday school occurs this afternoon at 7:30 p. m.
