CREDITORS WATCH CASH.

The Cincinnati, Washington & Baltimore Placed in the Hands of Receivers. CINCINNATI, Dec. 31.-Application was made this morning before Judge Peck, of the superior court for the Cincinnati, Washington & Baltimore railroad, Washington & Baltimore railroad. The judge appointed Col. Orland Smith, who has been president of the road, and J. H. Morgan, vice president of the Merchants National bank of this city, as joint receivers. Each gave bond in the sum of \$10,000. The petition was filed by the Farmers' & Merchants' company of New York, which is a trustee of the mortgaged creditors of the Chicago, Washington & Baltimore road. It asserts that the road is insolvent, and that it is insolvent, and that there is no other way in which equitable relief can be obtained. The indebtedness upon which the petition is based is \$7,000,000. On this is an accrued interest amounting to \$350,000. The Baltimore & Ohio railroad has refused to pay the interest, and acquiesced in the proceeding. It has a claim for the payment of \$350,000 of interest. A judgment was entered some 1000 in favor of the company for \$300,000 in favor of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad company for supplies and current expenses. The affidavit of the secretary and auditor of the road attached to the petition shows that the bonded indebtedness of the road is \$14,705,000, secured by the mortgages, on which the total fixed charges amount to \$700,735. The interest on this amount is \$10,828 with interest from the time they fell due. The net earnings of the road since its organization have fallen short of meeting the fixed charges to the sum of \$1,232,000. Its indebtedness in interest warrants during the proceeding is \$655,500, making its present indebtedness nearly \$1,000,000, and to-morrow this will be increased by coupons falling due to the amount of \$93,500. The company has also issued \$7,500,000 of Inter-city bonds in the amount of \$10,828 before mentioned. The two receivers were put in possession of the road and authorized to proceed with its management. It is expected that the proceedings will result in bringing about an equitable readjustment of the bonded indebtedness of the company and the fixed charges so that the company will be enabled to operate on a solvent footing.
