ROTUNDA RIPPLES.

The lobby of the Merchants was filled with legislators yesterday afternoon, most of them carrying grips preparatory to going home for two or three days. Complaints of swelled head were frequent, and the principal topic of conversation was Wednesday's banquet at Minneapolis. Some of the rural members said they had never had such a royal time, while others complained that their water glasses were studiously kept full, but their wine glasses were neglected. The general expression being that wine was plentiful and of good quality.

There is much trouble and anxiety in the minds of many members over the conflict of dates between the prospective banquets next week. Invitations are out for a banquet at the Ryan by Col. Graves next Tuesday, while a similar entertainment will take place at Minneapolis in honor of Senator-elect Washburn the same evening. Most of the legislators feel that it would be too great a strain on their minds to attend two such affairs on the same evening, but it is out of the question to let anything of the kind pass unattended. They are therefore anxious that the Minneapolis date shall be changed.

The members of the state board of health did some energetic lobbying yesterday. They were anxious that the salary of their secretary should be raised, and seeing the parsimonious complexion which has come upon the face of the house, decided to let that pass and demand an increase of the appropriations for their use. As Dr. Smith put it: "The work of the board of health cannot be efficiently done without considerable money, and it would be very short-sighted policy to keep us hard up."

Hon. David Austin, mayor of La-Crosse, Wis., and Joseph Clarke, of the same place, also improved the hours between adjournment and train time by interviewing members on the proposed bridge over the Mississippi. Mr. Austin said: "We need the bridge badly. We have authority from the federal government and from the Wisconsin legislature, and now only need the permission of Minnesota. The capital is ready, and the money is ready to come from a few property owners in La-Crosse, who want everything their own way. If they will go to work and bridge the river themselves we will give them a bonus, but as they won't we fall to see the logic of preventing us from building."

Mr. Clarke, who accompanied Mayor Austin, is also president of the Water Power company at Sault Ste. Marie. He says that work is progressing on the river power canal at Sault Ste. Marie, and he expects it to be finished by Oct. 1. The contract calls for its completion two months earlier, but obstructions have prevented the work going on as rapidly as was expected. He claims that five years from now the "Soo" will have 50,000 population, and by the time the canal is finished they will have all the mills they can supply with power. The new lock will not be finished for five years, as they are a gigantic undertaking. The Canadian government has appropriated \$2,000,000 for the ship canal on the Canadian side, work on which is slowly progressing.

LOYAL TO HIS MEMORY

Veterans of the War Will Celebrate Washington's Birthday Appropriately.

Centennial of the Inauguration of the First President.

Training Children to Venerate the Deeds of Great Men.

Proved Unfaithful to His Trust, and Became an Embezzler.

Washington's birthday will be appropriately celebrated by the Minnesota Commandery of the Loyal Legion at the state capitol this afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock. The commemorative exercises will be held in the hall of the house of representatives, but on account of the limited seating capacity invitations to the main floor have been confined to state officers and members of the legislature. The galleries have been set apart for the public, and an interesting programme has been arranged for the afternoon. After music by Siebert's orchestra, Bishop Ireland will invoke the Divine blessing, "America," which the audience will be asked to join in singing, will furnish a fitting prelude to the address of Rev. Edward D. Niell, the orator of the occasion. "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," will be rendered by a soloist and capable chorus, after which Attorney General Clapp will read Washington's Farewell address. Another song, "Five in America, Home on the Front," and music by Siebert will close the exercises. The committee of arrangements comprises Gen. John B. Sanborn, Gen. E. C. Mason, U. S. A., Col. Charles H. Graves, Capt. E. G. Babt, Maj. G. O. White. The music will be under the direction of R. W. Middleton. In addition to commemorating the birthday of the father of his country, the celebration will also be an anniversary of his induction into office as chief magistrate.

When George Washington took the oath of office at New York as first president of the United States of America, 100 years ago, he mapped out his purposes of administration in an inaugural address of 1,300 words, in which he appeared as if twenty times. After four years of sagacious master workmanship in laying the foundations of the entire superstructure of the government, its methods of business and personnel, during that time pointing out the wisdom of fostering home industries, and giving utterance to that aphorism of administrative wisdom, "In time of peace prepare for war," he entered upon his second term in the inaugural brevity of 154 words and 6 lines.

In the closing days of his second administration Washington paid a visit to Georgetown college, near Washington, D. C., and writing of the event, one of the venerable priests of that institution said: "While the small college was surrounded by a white-washed paling fence a horseman, well stricken in years, rode a noble and stately steed, reined up his charger at the little gate, and hitched him to the fence. Alighting with grace and ease, he looked at the humble enclosure with a benevolent serenity of countenance and a placid look of confidence for a cordial reception. This every American gentleman feels in visiting the college. On the occasion of the young Prof. Matthews had the pleasure and honor to be the first to welcome to Georgetown college, George Washington. He declared that Washington 'was received by a poetical address of welcome by Robert Walsh, extant 127' afterward to become widely known as editor and publicist, and later United States consul to Paris. This action of Washington in visiting Georgetown college has been followed by his successors, for, with the exception of Gen. William Henry Harrison, who served but a month after his inauguration, and Gen. Garfield, whose sudden and sad taking off is still fresh in the public mind, all presidents have visited the college and assisted at the commencement exercises.

HAMLIN'S TRUSTEES.

Preparations Made to Contest a Case in Court.

Members of the board of trustees of Hamline University, among whom were Messrs. Hugh Harrison, Dean and Wymann, of Minneapolis; Dr. Dunn, of Duluth; Dr. Robert Forbes and Rev. Jordan, of St. Paul; Rev. E. R. Lathrop, of Worthington; Hon. F. W. Hoyt, of Red Wing; and Rev. E. P. Robertson, of Redwood Falls, took a run to the short line train to attend a special meeting. They had no sooner arrived at the Hamline depot they were button-holed by a number of students who proceeded at once to lay before them the necessity for an appropriation of a few hundred dollars for the maintenance of the gymnasium. The trustees were so foreable that upon arriving at their conference rooms and finding awaiting them a petition signed by almost all of the students, their prayers were at once granted, and \$500 was appropriated to fit out their empty gymnasium hall. A few other small items came up for the consideration of the board before proceeding to the chief business of the day. An amount was set aside for the improvement of the campus, and the resignation of Dr. J. F. Chaffee from the board was accepted.

The meeting of the trustees was called to consider the case of Mrs. Mary Ford and others, now pending in the district court against the trustee of the university. The suit is brought to recover possession of a large tract of land near the Red Rock camp ground, which was formerly owned by John Holton, father of Mary Ford, which was bequeathed by him to the trustee of the university. The plaintiffs claim that the father was of an unsound mind, being seventy-five years of age, and that there was no such corporation in existence at the time of his death. The defendants have retained a number of the ablest attorneys of St. Paul, and Hon. C. K. Davis will conduct the prosecution.

SHIFTING A FERRY.

Officers to Pass Upon a Proposed Change on the Big Horn.

Capt. John W. French, Twenty-fifth infantry; Capt. Albert G. Force, First cavalry; and First Lieut. R. P. THEY COVET THE PARK

Railroad Magnates Urge an Invasion of the Yellowstone.

Pushing a Measure Through Congress During the Last Hours.

Trying to Cloud the Title of Valuable City Real Estate.

Clever Amateurs Attract a Large Audience at a Church Entertainment.

A bill for the opening of a small section of the National park will be introduced during the closing hours of the present congress, and telegrams from interested parties in Washington substantiate that fact are in the possession of a gentleman in this city. This measure will be formulated in the interest of the Northern Pacific railroad, and its passage is fraught with importance to the country in general, and the Northwest in particular. The Rocky Fork & Cooke City railway have already built a road from Laurel on the main line to Red Lodge, a distance of forty-seven miles. H. C. Davis is president and Joseph B. Hubbell secretary of this line, and in December last these gentlemen closed a preliminary agreement with Gov. Hauser, Henry Villard and other prominent men for the completion of the road, and the development of the coal fields in the vicinity of the Red Lodge. These fields are owned by the Rocky Fork company, and J. B. Alexander, a mining expert, recently made a survey of them.
