Is to be of stone, two stories high with basement, and will occupy a half block of ground, being 375x130 feet. The front and side elevation will undoubtedly be executed in Kasota stone.

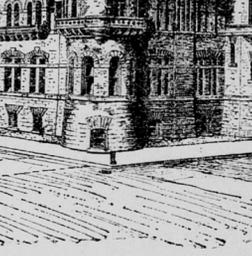
THE LOCAL SOLDIERY.

Gallant Militia Lads Who Headquarters in Minneapolis.

The military organizations of Minneapolis comprise some ten companies and about 250 men, and are a credit to the city. Companies A, B, I and G are N. G. S. M., and the battery of light artillery are the only state organizations in the city, all the others being independent.

Company B was originally organized as a cavalry company by George M. Naylor, afterwards major in the First regiment, about eight years ago.

Company I is about six years of age, and is commanded by Capt. Watery. The company prides itself on having the tallest, finest-looking men of any of the local companies.

Of light artillery has about twenty members and is commanded by Lieut. C. C. Bennett.

Capt. Warner has organized two cavalry troops within the last year and both are in a prosperous condition at present. The first, the Minneapolis cavalry company, was organized in June, 1888, and now has about twenty members.

Besides the companies named above, there are several other independent organizations, some of them strong in number and of much merit from a military point of view.

Several of the large illustrations in this number of the GLOBE are taken from "Illustrated Minneapolis," the work that has been recently issued under the sanction of the board of trade.

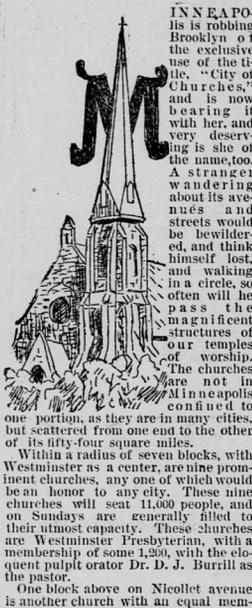
THE CHURCH EDIFICES

Minneapolis Rapidly Becoming the Brooklyn of the Northwest.

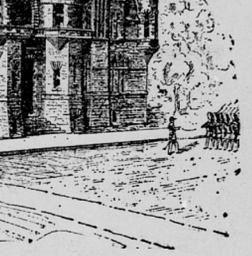
Stately Houses of Worship That Compare With Those of Other Cities.
