SOLD FOR FULL VALUE. Spirited Bidding at the Sale of the Reform School Property.

The sale of the plat of the state reform school site commenced yesterday morning. Owing to the inclemency of the weather, the auction was held in the chapel.

A large crowd of real estate men were present, and the bidding spirited. At the commencement H. S. Fairchild, representing the committee of the real estate board, made a few remarks on the probability of the city annexing the school site.

He explained the situation in which the trustees found themselves in, being unable to amend the original plat, and that they were now bidding for the school site.

This difficulty could be easily surmounted by those present refusing to bid for such lots. By so refusing they would have withdrawn their bids.

Both the real estate board, the trustees of the reform school and all owners of property in the vicinity, Mr. Fairchild stated, were in favor of the school site.

Not a bid was made for any lot in blocks 1 or 2. Then block 4 was put up, and the Marshall avenue lots sold rapidly at prices of ten per cent over the value.

Great satisfaction was caused by the sale of the property, and the spirited nature of the bidding. The prices obtained were as follows:

The principal buying was done for outside parties, who bought with a view to speculation, but three men bought with the avowed intention of building residences at once.

The sale will be continued at 10 o'clock, and if the present scale of prices keeps up the result will be eminently satisfactory.
