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HUNDREDS HOMELESS.

Fire Destroys Over a Million Dollars' Worth of Property at Bakersfield, Cal.

Two Members of a Montana Firm Fight With Fatal Results.

The Fire Department Called Out to Squelch a La Salle, Ill., Man.

A Professor in a Southern College Skips Out With a Lewd Woman.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 7.—This afternoon fire broke out in the kitchen of N. E. Kelsey's house in the same block as the Secker hotel. In spite of all efforts it spread to the adjoining building, also of wood, and then to the Southern hotel. From there it spread rapidly, with the result that every business house in town is burned, besides about forty dwelling houses, involving a loss of perhaps \$1,250,000. The fire department could not begin to cope with the fire, it came so quickly, burned so fiercely and spread so rapidly. Thirteen blocks were wiped out. No hotel, restaurant or business house is left. As soon as the fire subsided measures were taken to feed the homeless. There was no time to save stocks of merchandise. One hundred extra policemen have been detailed to guard the little that was saved. Bakersfield is in the northern part of what is locally termed Southern California, and has a population of 5,000.

DROPPED BRAGG.

The General Coolly Treated by a G. A. R. Post. FOND DU LAC, Wis., July 7.—The Grand army post at a meeting last night and dropped Gen. Bragg from the list of members. The meeting was a very stormy one, and when the vote was taken it was 3 to 1 against Bragg. The trouble over the matter was occasioned by the fact that Gen. Bragg had been expelled from the post on the ground that he was a traitor. A previous attempt to court-martial the general at that time was beaten. Since that time Bragg has been a member of the post, although he was its first commander.

THIS IS FISHY.

Perhaps This Is a Clue to Cronin's Murderer. BUFFALO, N. Y., July 7.—This afternoon a water-soaked letter with illegible address was found on the shore of Third Sister island by Charles B. Smith, of Niagara Falls. It was the name of Supp. A. V. Welch. It purports to have been written by a man premeditating suicide to his brother, and is signed "Ed." The writer tells how he helped at Chicago to get rid of C. "that devilish traitor and spy," and how he was wanted for "the trunk," and how he overcame by fear that the plot has miscarried and by removal of his criminal record to the authenticity of the letter is the finding on June 27 of a decomposed body of a man, which was buried without identification at Drummondville.

TURNNED THE HOSE ON HIM.

An Illinois Man Fatally Wounds His Wife and Himself. LA SALLE, Ill., July 7.—Capt. A. Goshinski, of the Polish guards, of this city, fired three bullets into his sleeping wife this morning and then tried to end his own existence. Mrs. Goshinski, in her night dress, and with the blood streaming from her forehead, jumped through a window and ran to a neighbor's house. With two revolvers, one in each hand, Goshinski climbed out upon the roof and placed the muzzle of one pistol over his heart and the other in his ear, and pulled the triggers. Both he and his wife were killed. There was no chance of recovery. Financial difficulties formed the motive for the tragedy.

SKIPS WITH A CYPRIAN.

A Georgia Professor Forms a Strange Attachment. ATLANTA, Ga., July 7.—Clark university, one of the leading Southern colleges, for a long time has been a pension of Prof. W. H. Siford, who has charge of the mechanical department, came here with his wife from Ohio several years ago and made a good record. His wife is an invalid. Some time ago Siford became infatuated with Minnie Warren, a keeper of a house of ill fame in Augusta. Siford has frequently tried to persuade this woman to marry him. She would not do so. Some weeks ago he and his wife went to an educational meeting in Cincinnati, where they passed as man and wife. Mrs. Siford had no idea of her husband's activities. He had written her a letter in which he wrote to commit suicide, and begging that he be buried in potter's field. It is supposed, however, that he had planned to do so, and he has been heard of in New York city.

OVER \$30,000 SHORT.

An Ohio Cashier Makes a Consolation of Expecting Charles ZANESVILLE, O., July 7.—Hell D. Miller, cashier of the Malta National bank, of Malta, O., twenty-six miles south of here, has disappeared. There is a shortage in his accounts, it is said, of at least \$30,000, and it may reach \$50,000. He has a wife and two children. He made good the loss to the amount of \$20,000. Before leaving he made a confession and turned over his property and \$100,000 in cash to his bondsmen. Miller is said to be either in Eugene City, Or., or British Columbia.

DEATH TO THREE.

Result of a Game of Craps in Alabama. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., July 7.—To-day a crowd of negroes was playing craps on Red mountain, when Henry Nichols shot and severely wounded three men, white, and fled. The other negroes boarded a train at Birmingham City, expecting Charles Nichols to get on the train further down toward Birmingham. They were right, and when Nichols came aboard and saw his pursuers armed with pistols, he drew a pistol, killing Jack Saunders and Bob Dickson. He was ridden with bullets, but jumped from the train, ran a short distance and dropped dead. Jack Chesney (white), a watchman, was seriously injured.

He Was Short \$900.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 7.—Louis C. Hort, representing in this city the wholesale tea and cigar house of H. C. Fisher, of Chicago, left his home as usual at 8 o'clock last Wednesday morning and has not been heard of since. He has been seen or heard of him, either by his wife or friends. The firm of H. C. Fisher was formerly located in St. Joseph, but several years ago removed its business to Chicago. Three years ago Hort was appointed representative of the company at this point. Since his disappearance a shortage of \$900 has been discovered and the investigation is not completed yet.
