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FOUGHT LIKE A TIGER.

Puglist Ahern and His Friends Held for Murder.

St. Louis, Sept. 18.—As a result of the inquiry over the body of young Thomas E. Jackson, killed in a prize fight at Daly's saloon at an early hour yesterday morning, Ed Ahern, the surviving principal, was held without bail to answer to the charge of murder, while referee, seconds, and accessories and abettors. All of the parties held by the coroner as accessories gave bail for their appearance Sept. 20 were released. Ahern was remanded without bail. The case looks worse and worse under investigation. An eye witness of the round in which Jackson received the injuries which resulted in his death:

As soon as Jackson fell, with the agility of a bloodthirsty hyena, pounced upon him, and with a few blows from his gloved hands, he struck Jackson on the back of his head with banded against the floor with terrific force. If the referee had not stepped in, the result of the concussion of the brain, then he received the fatal blow, and lay motionless on the floor.
