FREE WOOL.

What a Farm Paper Among Wool Growers Has to Say About It.

The Fargo Farmer and Breeder, in reply to some Montana patrons who object to free wool, says: Wool has been a special hobby with tariff matters, and for over twenty years has been favored with "protection" to suit the demand of the men who thought they knew what was for the interest of the industry.

Another significant fact is that the wool grown in this country is not affected by the tariff. Manufacturers claim that it would not pay to import such wool, and the tariff of 10 cents per pound we know, does not raise the price to increase rather than diminish the demand for home-grown wools with which they are mixed by manufacturers.
