A Chicago Company Involved,

\$1,500,000.

Mismanagement and Outside
Speculation Caused This
Commercial Crash.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The suspension of J. O. Preble & Co., manufacturers of blank books and envelopes, and J. B. Sheffield & Sons, manufacturers of paper and general stationery, is announced to-day. In addition to these two firms, the Washburn Manufacturing company, of Chicago, is involved. The liabilities of the three companies will exceed \$1,000,000. As to the cause of the failure it may be stated in general terms, it is due to mismanagement at the mills and in the manufacturing part of the business. It is hinted that several other firms are involved, which may be expected to go down in the crash. The firms of Preble & Co. and Sheffield & Son, together with the bundery of the Saugerties Blank Book company, are all situated at Saugerties, and are closely related under the same general management. About 1,000 people are employed by them, and the manufacturers of the three concerns constitute about the same.

INTERESTS OF THE VILLAGE.
It is said that the monthly output of the manufacturers was about \$100,000, and that the pay rolls amounted to nearly \$2,000 each month. The Saugerties Blank Book company has been in operation since 1850, and the Sheffield & Son since 1855. The three concerns are reported to be \$1,500,000. The failure is attributed to the embarrassment of Sheffield & Son, who dragged down Preble & Co. They were all closely connected in business, the paper product of Sheffield & Son being sold to-day under the same name as the Messrs. Preble and W. R. Sheffield are the owners of the business for upwards of fifty years, and which has been the mainstay of the country in the trade. He was always supposed to be wealthy, and only a few months ago he claimed to be worth \$4,000. He was millionaire before the panic of 1873, and he was reported to have

He had been interested in numerous concerns outside of his regular business, one of which was the Saugerties weighing machines, of which company he was the president. Mr. Preble said to a United Press reporter to-day that his firm, J. P. THE WARRANT WAS NO GOOD
Vain Attempt of a Constable to
Arrest Master Workman Powderly.

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 21.—Constable Washbaugh, of Westmoreland county, arrived in the city at 9:25 o'clock this morning, with a warrant for the arrest of General Master Workman Powderly. He requested Aid. Fuller to endorse the warrant, that the constable could make it out. Upon examining the warrant the aidman found that it contained no specific allegation, making a general charge of conspiracy and omitting to allege a specific crime. This warrant he held to be defective and refused its endorsement. At the suggestion of Aid. Fuller, Constable Washbaugh submitted the warrant to Judge Archibald for examination. Judge Archibald scanned it critically and advised the constable not to attempt to make an arrest upon it. It is supposed that Mr. Washbaugh then left for Scranton. MALLETTO IS KING.

Recognized as ruler of Samoa by the United States, England and Germany.
APIA, Samoa, Dec. 7, per Steamer Alamea to San Francisco, Dec. 21.—King Malletto has at last been formally recognized as ruler of Samoa by the consuls of the United States, Great Britain and Germany. About a month ago the consuls issued a proclamation declaring that the Berlin conference had agreed to recognize Malletto as king, and inviting the natives to acknowledge him as such. Tamasese replied to this proclamation by saying that such a course should be taken. Malletto and Mataafa agreed to the suggestions of the consuls, and the Berlin conference was made. Malletto also signed a document acknowledging Malletto as the king. As soon as the consuls had received the necessary preparations were made for an official announcement of Malletto's authority. Accordingly, on Dec. 5, Malletto's flag was hoisted on the site of the old government house and the United States man-of-war Adams fired a salute of twenty-one guns in honor. The German man-of-war Sophie, which was also lying in the harbor, did not fire a salute. The consuls held a conference with Malletto and Mataafa, and the latter generally issued a proclamation declaring that the governments of the United States, Great Britain and Germany from this time forth would recognize Malletto as king. The proclamation also advised that the two native parties which have been in dispute should be reconciled as soon as possible, and contribute to the peaceable management of the new Samoan government. This proclamation was signed by Dr. Steuehl, German consul-general; H. de Coelgen, British consul, and J. B. Blacklock, United States consul. It was printed in the English and Samoan languages and posted in various parts of the island. The proclamation generally expressed that this action on the part of the three consuls is ultimate settlement of the Samoan difficulty.
