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THE FIRES IN 1890.

The Council Has a Lively Meeting as a Send-off.

The Widening of Hennepin Avenue Stirs Up the Animals.

Haney Says, "What Are You Going to Do About It?"

Another Fire at the University Yesterday--The Baptist Convention.

Thirty-six out of the thirty-nine aldermen were in their seats when President Johnson called the council to order yesterday.

Among the usual communications was an invitation from the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd inviting the council to visit their institution and investigate the work they are doing in reforming erring girls who are sent to them.

The appointment of A. Edgar Allen and Oscar J. Smith as deputy clerks of the municipal court was confirmed by a communication from Supt. West, of the workhouse, asking for an increase of salary, was referred to the committee composed of the committees on salaries and workhouses.

There was a quiet little stab at the re-trenchment and reform policy of the aldermen of the Twelfth ward in a communication which was passed hurriedly over by Clerk Haney, with the remark that it contained charges against the street commissioner of the Twelfth ward.

Ald. Woodward moved that the matter be referred to a special committee consisting of three aldermen for investigation, with power to send for persons and papers. President Johnson approved the motion.

The committee on public grounds and buildings were instructed to place the stars and stripes on the city buildings. James Gordon was awarded the contract for grading Lake street from Exchange street to city limits, at 13.9 cents per cubic yard.

The opening of Thirty-fourth street from Irving avenue to Lake Calhoun boulevard was confirmed by a vote of 26 yeas and 6 nays.

An ordinance amending the penalties for violation of city ordinance was passed. The ordinance provides that any person who violates the ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100.

The committee on underground wires reported in favor of allowing the Brush Electric Light company to make connections with the new subscribers. The report was adopted.

Chief Engineer Stetson, of the fire department, was given permission to purchase fifty tarpaulins for the use of the department in saving goods from destruction by water.

A vote of thanks was tendered Mayor Pillsbury for his portrait, which he presented to the city.

THOSE LITTLE FEES. City Clerk Haney Explains His Position. The publication yesterday that City Clerk Charles F. Haney had not turned all the fees received by him into the city treasury was the cause of considerable comment.

When the star-eyed goddess of retrenchment and reform, personified by the present Republican municipal administration, marched into the city hall, every one connected with the "wide open and corrupt" representatives of Democracy from the "eleventh hour" were badly fired, and a number of nice, quiet, Christian gentlemen were installed in the vacant places.

When Charles F. Haney was elected city clerk there was a big talk about retrenchment and the abolition of the fee system which the Republicans claimed was so nefarious. Mr. Haney was heartily in favor of abolishing the fee system in his official capacity.
