**BOREAS ON A BENDER.**

A Genuine Blizzard Raging  
in Manitoba and North  
Dakota.

Twenty-Four Hours of High  
Wind and Heavy Snow-  
Fall.

Business in Winnipeg at a  
Standstill Because of the  
Storm.

Pennsylvania Visited and  
Devastated by a Section  
of the Blizzard.

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 7.—Manitoba  
was visited today by one of the fiercest  
blizzards ever experienced, certainly  
the worst since March, 1882. Consider-  
able snow has fallen lately, and people  
congratulated themselves that it was  
sticking closely to the ground, but they  
were too previous, for today it piled  
in heaps to ten feet high in the most  
undesirable places. The storm  
came up about midnight and lasted  
twenty-four hours. The wind was so  
strong that it was perilous to get out of  
doors, and the air was full of snow  
that pedestrians could not see fifty feet  
ahead. Business in this city today was  
simply paralyzed. People living on side  
streets didn't get their morning papers  
until this afternoon. Milkmen and bakers  
failed to call on their customers; the  
schools were closed because children  
could not get to school, and the streets  
could not run. In short, everybody  
took a holiday.

BECAUSE THEY HAD TO.  
All this left on the morning, but  
all were considerably behind time  
in arriving at their respective destina-  
tions. The only business that was  
performed as usual was the postal de-  
livery. The situation has been made  
more interesting by the fact that a fire  
alarm almost every hour since mid-  
night last night, the fire bells being  
kept busy extinguishing small blazes in  
isolated localities. The snow on the  
fire, however, which destroyed the  
Montgomery Carriage works and black-  
smith shops, and the fact that the  
points indicate a similar state of affairs  
as far west as the boundaries of the  
province, and as far east as Fort Ar-  
more, Minn. The thermometer did not  
reach zero.

SATX CENTER, Minn., Feb. 7.—A  
genuine blizzard of the season is raging  
here, and traffic is liable to be generally  
stopped for a time.  
SUNDAY RAPIDS, N. D., Feb. 7.—A fierce  
blizzard from the northwest struck here  
about 6 o'clock this evening and is still  
raging with unabated fury. The ther-  
mometer has fallen to 20 below zero in  
the last ten hours, and it is growing  
colder. Reports from the north and  
west indicate that a similar blizzard  
is raging, and the weather is growing  
colder rapidly.

ST. VINCENT, Minn., Feb. 7.—The  
fierce blizzard of the season is raging  
here. The guests from St. Vincent  
who went to Fort Pembina, distant only  
one mile from here, did not get there  
until this evening. The blizzard is  
still snow-bound there. The Northern  
Pacific train from the south  
could not get here late. The Manito-  
ba trains are on time.

STEPHEN, Minn., Feb. 7.—The most  
terrible blizzard that has ever been  
witnessed by even the best inhabitant, is  
raging from the north. The snow is  
coming down in a heavy, steady  
cloud of snow. It is now 10 below zero,  
and growing colder.

BOREAS' CHILLY BREATH.  
It is Blown Across North Dakota  
With a Vengeance.

FARGO, N. D., Feb. 7.—The first real  
blizzard of the winter has raged here  
today. The wind is from the north,  
and the thermometer has held at  
about zero during the day but is low-  
ering rapidly to-night, and predictions are  
that it will drop to thirty below zero  
before the day is over. The blizzard has  
been blowing since late in the afternoon,  
rendering pedestrianism almost im-  
possible.

SNOW, RAIN, HAIL AND WIND.  
A Combination Storm Devastates  
Pennsylvania.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 7.—The worst  
storm in years has been raging through-  
out Western Pennsylvania since noon  
today. Snow, hail, rain and wind have  
been playing havoc. In this city no  
damage was done by the wind, but the  
snow and hail have blocked many of  
the streets and stopped street car  
traffic, while telegraph and telephone  
lines are breaking down under the  
heavy weight of snow. The wind is  
coasting in from the mountains  
and is doing serious damage to property.  
At Uniontown, Pa., the roof was blown  
off the Methodist Episcopal church, a  
part of it falling on the house of John  
Brown, just north of the church, crush-  
ing it in like an egg shell. The tower  
of the church, it is feared, is so badly  
shattered that it will have to be torn  
down. The roof of the large new building  
lately erected by the Pennsylvania Con-  
struction company, below town, was  
also blown off. A horse and wagon  
driven by James Kusch were blown over  
Gray's hill. The wagon is lying on its  
back with the wheels whirling in the  
air. No one was seriously hurt. Post-  
master Baker's new house was nearly  
demolished, also James Frankenberg's  
house, and John Winger's house was  
levelled to the ground. The telephone  
and electric lines are down.

WIBES ARE ALL DOWN.  
None of the coke works are running  
except at Uniontown. The coke works  
of the H. C. Erick Coke company  
were blown down and entirely dem-  
olished. The end was blown out of  
the engine house at Leitch, and the Warren  
glass works wrecked. The roof of the  
Lutheran church was also blown off.  
The loss at Uniontown is lying on the  
order of \$100,000. At Connellsville the storm  
began in the morning and did not sub-  
side until late in evening. In this section  
the loss will reach over \$100,000. H.  
Herp's retail store and house in this  
place was completely wrecked, the in-  
mates having a narrow escape from  
death. The Catholic church is in a  
dangerous condition, and a number of  
other houses in the town are wrecked.  
The ticket office of the Burlington &  
Northern was robbed at noon today  
of \$54, while the agent was at dinner.  
The door was pried open with a  
pick, and the bill emptied of its con-  
tents. Tramps are suspected, and officers  
are in pursuit of them.

**WRECKED BY THE WIND.**

Glass Works at Blairville, Pa.,  
Blown Down.

BLAIRVILLE, Pa., Feb. 7.—The new  
glass works at this place were blown  
down during a severe storm this evening.  
Charles Barr, superintendent, and  
Mr. Bierney were killed and a number  
of persons injured. The men killed  
were from Tarentum. Supt. Barr is  
still under the wreck. Another man,  
unknown, is under the debris and is un-  
doubtedly killed. The building was  
made of brick and is a total wreck.

REV. DR. BALL ROUTED.  
The Buffalo Divine Loses His Fa-  
mous Divorce Suit.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 7.—Judge Dan-  
iels charged the jury this morning in the  
suit of Rev. Dr. Ball against the New  
York Evening Post. The judge read  
the articles upon which the actions were  
based, going over them sentence by  
sentence, and dwelling upon their im-  
port, whether implied or understood.  
Dr. Ball said, in his rights, to investi-  
gate the character of Mr. Cleveland if  
he saw fit to do so, and it was for the  
jury to determine whether such an in-  
vestigation was a proper one. He re-  
minded the Post in saying or insinuat-  
ing that he was a gutter-snipe. If Mr. Ball  
did it, further, whether the articles  
justification for the Post to libel  
plaintiff, supposing it had done so.  
The jury were requested to remember  
that certain letters before him as well  
as an article published in the Courier,  
signed by sixteen citizens, and a ver-  
dict, "No cause of action," thus de-  
feating Rev. Mr. Ball.
